Toolbox Spotlight

The <u>WoodOX Sling Firewood Carrier</u> positions the load under the user's arm (on either side) so that the weight is distributed across the upper body (rather than it being all on one side and transported by one arm). This design means an upward shift in the carrier's center of gravity to promote less strain on the body and less chance of the load tripping in transit.

Chuck Baldwin of the National AgrAbility Project (NAP)/Purdue University and Amanda Harguth with AgrAbility of Wisconsin/University of Wisconsin staffed a booth at the World Dairy Expo the week of October 1-5, 2019. The event is held annually at the Alliant Energy Center in Madison, WI.

According to the *Wisconsin Ag Connection*, more than 62,200 people from 94 countries attended the event. By count, the top nations represented were Canada, Mexico, Italy, China, Brazil, and Japan respectively.



Nearly 860 companies featured their products and services in the trade show areas, and among them was AgrAbility. The AgrAbility exhibit included general information on both the National and the Wisconsin AgrAbility projects, brochures and booklets on such topics as arthritis and agriculture (in Spanish and English), back problems in agriculture, and AgrAbility services for veterans. Free DVDs sharing AgrAbility's vision and

mission were offered, as were a few free samples of assistive technology in the way

California AgrAbility conducted outreach at the Farmworker Appreciation Day hosted by the Mexican consulate in French Camp, an agricultural community near Stockton, California. The event was held in a family migrant center and brought families from nearby migrant centers. Staff spoke to about 150 families and children about agricultural health and safety. Many of the



children brought their parents to the AgrAbility booth. Staff led various arthritis exercises for farmworkers suffering with low joint mobility and aches and pains from laborious tasks such as hoeing and pruning. The event featured dancing and singing performances from the children living in these communities.

California AgrAbility staffed a booth at the annual Mexican Independence Day Celebration in Yuba City. Located in Sutter County, the community is largely composed of small orchard farmers plus agricultural and packing plant workers. The festivities attracted 1,000 attendees. Staff spoke to attendees about program services and networked with representatives from the Employment Development Department, Sutter County, and Farm Bureau.



Staff attended the Nutrition, Health, and Safety Fair at the Westwood Elementary school. This event brought resources from the local community as well as from around the state to educate elementary school kids and their parents on various topics. Topics ranged from dental care to pesticide regulation awareness. Staff was able to educate around 100 students, teachers, and parents on gardening safely while showcasing assistive tools that would help prevent chronic illness.

The Merger is Official! Goodwill Industries of Denver and Discover Goodwill of Southern & Western Colorado have finalized a merger between the two organizations. Discover Goodwill[©], based in Colorado Springs, and Goodwill Industries of Denver will maintain their current administrative offices, retail stores, donation centers, and other localized programs that together serve more than 100,000 individuals throughout Colorado each year. Both organizational boards approved the merger, and with the Goodwill Industries International board of



directors' approval of the consolidation of territory, the two organizations will combine operations effective immediately.

The combined organization will now serve all 64 counties in Colorado with localized career development programming, 43 retail stores, 4 outlets, and 12 stand-alone donation centers, employing more than 2,700 workers.

After reconstructive ankle surgery, Bill Renshaw of Union City struggled to climb onto some of his farm equipment, especially the skid loader. Bill's need was submitted to the MSU Mechanical Engineering 481 class for senior students to design and build a solution as a capstone project.



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With some additional engineering by ag engineer Ned Stoller, the accommodation works perfectly. Bars extending from the loader cab provide handles that Bill can use from either the front or side to



safely pull himself into the cab. The attached chains give easy access for retracting the bars back in place once he is seated. Safety hinges move the bar extensions upward in case they are accidentally left in the extended position. The bars are sturdy - made of 1-inch square steel tubing -

secure, and don't compromise existing cab safety features. A simple solution to make access easier to a piece of equipment that gets lots of use!



Last month, Michigan AgrAbility announced the opening of the AgrAbility Demonstration Farm partnering with Holland area farmer Doug VerHoeven so farmers can "try before they buy". Michigan AgrAbility submitted a short article about the demonstration farm and a picture of Doug VerHoeven to the MSU Extension Dairy Work Group for inclusion in their annual "upcoming programs" booklet. The booklet is sent to all Michigan dairy producers so they can review all of the MSU Extension dairy programs and ongoing research projects that will be of interest to them. North Carolina

On September 1, North Carolina was awarded by USDA-NIFA with a 2019-2023 AgrAbility grant to support farmers with disabilities in the state. With the main goal of increasing independent living and the quality of life for agricultural workers with disabilities, NC AgrAbility will be providing agricultural farm workers and their families with farm safety education, assistive technology assistance, and networking support.

NC AgrAbility was invited to train NRCS agents on how to work with veterans and disabled farmers at the NRCS annual meeting



in Morganton on September 11. The event was attended by around 45 NRCS agents from the western region in NC. It was a great opportunity for networking and increasing awareness about working with farmers with disabilities. Most of



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the agents who participated at the event enrolled in the NC AgrAbility listserv and one of them committed to serving on the NC AgrAbility Advisory Board.



NC AgrAbility participated as an exhibitor at the first Hispanic Farmers and Agricultural Professionals Symposium which was held Friday, September 13 at the North Carolina Farm Bureau headquarters in Raleigh. Over 125 people from the southeastern region attended; among them, 39 Hispanic farmers had the



opportunity to connect and learn about the different resources available to them in the U.S.



The NC AgrAbility advisory board met for the first time in the new cycle on September 18. The board is gaining more members from various organizations across the state and from other departments at NCA&T. In an effort to gain a better understanding of the issues that NC AgrAbility faces in serving the NC farmers, the meeting was held at the NC A&T farm and ended with touring the farm while opening discussion about how

to better assist and educate farmers with disabilities in North Carolina.

NC AgrAbility was invited to the NCA&T county operations Zoom Meeting on September 20. At this meeting, county Extension directors and county Extension agents had the opportunity to learn more about the services provided by NC AgrAbility and about how to refer farmers to the program for direct services. They were also provided information about the educational activities that NC AgrAbility has that can be used when they have activities with farmers in their counties.

> On September 21, Dr. Crystal Kyle and Beatriz Rodriguez were invited as keynote speakers at the Beekeepers and Farmers Conference at the Hill Family Farm and Educational Center in Whitakers, NC. The event was attended by



around 40 participants who learned about NC AgrAbility among many other interesting topics Bee Excellent Association and the USDA NRCS



provided by the Bee Excellent Association and the USDA NRCS program.



NC AgrAbility participated as an exhibitor and presenter at the Assistive Technology Vendor EXPO in Raleigh, NC, on September 26. This event is the largest gathering of vendors who help individuals with disabilities across the state. It provided hands-on assistive technology demos and a 20-minute vendor training. This year, the event was attended by more than 350 participants.

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Ohio



The Ohio AgrAbility Program's dual missions of education and assistance to farmers with disabilities were on display at the 2019 Farm Science Review on September 17-19. Staff, farmers, and vendors were on hand to answer questions, greet visitors, demonstrate assistive technology and equipment, and talk about Ohio AgrAbility. To ensure no mobility devices ran out of power, OAP provided a mobility scooter and chair charging

station for participants needing a re-charge. To facilitate access to the field demonstrations, AgrAbility sponsored an accessible shuttle bus to transport visitors from the main exhibit area to the farm fields.

OAP held daily "Fitness for Farm Life: Stretching and Everyday Exercises" sessions. Attendees were offered tips on safely lifting and carrying heavy items and other ways to protect their backs from injury. Leah Schwinn, occupational therapy doctoral student, also led participants in a quick stretching routine, demonstrating how farmers can easily add stretching to their workday.



In addition to publications and workshops, OAP showcased some of its most important education and outreach partners: their farmers. For FSR 2019, OAP invited their farmers to spend a few hours in the tent to greet visitors, try out new equipment, share their experiences with Ohio AgrAbility, and talk to students about farming with a disability.

AgrAbility education and outreach went well beyond the OAP exhibit tent. In the Utzinger Memorial Garden, staff presented a session on gardening through the life span. Even when staff were not presenting workshops in the garden, OAP was still on display: staff designed large "garden signs" with tips on gardening with low vision, arthritis, and other imitations, which were planted throughout the garden. In addition to the exhibit tent and workshops, Ohio AgrAbility hosted the Universal Design Garage (part of a larger UD house) and offered examples and information on using universal design in the workshop and farm.

OAP featured a new exhibit area in 2019 - "Ohio AgrAbility: A Focus on Livestock", with adapted equipment and information posters detailing how modifications and assistive technology can help farmers with and without disabilities farm safely. The exhibit featured equipment and vendors from Life Essentials, PWR EZ Systems, K & M Manufacturing, and Propel Sliding Door Automation. The vendors displayed and demonstrated their products, answered questions, and worked with staff and farmers to problem-solve issues that may limit the farmers' productivity or ability to safely use and access their equipment and facilities.
