Toolbox Spotlight



The <u>Workshop Ceiling-Track System</u> is designed to keep cords and hoses off the ground or work surface so tasks can be accomplished without their getting in the way. The basic system includes a 4-foot track that houses two rolling trolleys, each of which accepts a ring-hook and a 21/2-inch J-hook onto which extension cords, air-fittings, hoses, etc. can be hung.

In September, the USDA's Office of Advocacy and Outreach announced that the Peoples Foundation in California with partners National AgrAbility Project (NAP) and Legacy Farming and Health Group (LFHG) in Indiana had been awarded a three-year Outreach and Assistance for Socially Disadvantaged Farmers and Ranchers and Veteran Farmers and Ranchers grant (also known as a 2501 grant). The primary purpose of the grant is to assist socially disadvantaged and veteran farmers and ranchers in owning and operating farms and ranches while increasing their participation in agricultural programs and services provided by the USDA. The name of the new project in which the NAP is a partner is the LIFE (Legacy Innovation Farming Economics) Project. This project will allow the NAP to increase its outreach to veteran and minority farmers and ranchers, help provide funding for farmer/rancher stipends to the NTW for these agricultural groups, and give NAP staff valuable experience in working as a partner with other groups serving socially disadvantaged agricultural communities.

November 1-2, Chuck Baldwin, National AgrAbility Project's underserved populations outreach coordinator, participated in the 29th annual conference of the National Black Farmers Association in Prattville, Alabama, as a presenter and exhibitor. More than 500 people, most of them African American farmers, attended the meetings and festivities.



The theme of the conference was "ReClaiming, ReGaining, and ReGenerating Our Farms." In addition to a wide variety of speakers from USDA organizations like AgrAbility, FSA, and NRCS, video greetings were conveyed by Secretary of

Agriculture Sonny Perdue, and the keynote speaker was Rohan Marley, son of reggae artist and legend, Bob Marley.

Rohan Marley is an entrepreneur and former football player for the University of Miami Hurricanes and the Canadian professional football league. He is the founder (2009) of Marley Coffee, an organic coffee plantation and sustainable farming business. In 2012, Marley founded the "House of Marley," a range of eco-friendly headphones and stereo speakers which are currently top sellers at such major consumer electronic stores as Best Buy, PC Richards, Verizon, and others. Rohan is also the founder of "Lion Order by Rohan Marley," a cannabis and CBD line of products to begin distribution in Colorado and eventually other states beginning in 2020.

Chuck Baldwin's AgrAbility address compared AgrAbility to a good marriage partner for the times in a farmer's/rancher's life when things get tough as a result of a disability or functional limitation. He shared that during those times, a partner is needed who gives respect, who will sit down at the kitchen table and listen before speaking, who doesn't see the person before them as any less capable because they have a limitation, and who believes that by putting their heads together they can come up with solutions that will improve the farmer's quality of life and keep them doing what they love to do for as long as possible. Baldwin explained how AgrAbility can be that partner.



Also attending the NBFA conference were eight members of the LIFE Project in which the NAP is a partner. Legacy Farming and Health Group founder John Jamerson, an African American farmer from Princeton, Indiana, and a member of the historically significant Lyle's Station group of Black farmers, was there with his wife Denise, son DeAnthony, and brother TJ. Tameka Peoples, founder and president of the Peoples

Tameka Peoples, founder and president of the Peoples Foundation was also there, as were Jettie Townsend (Haven Trust) and his daughter, Andrommeda, and Gabriel MontReynaud (Pangea Farms). Chuck was able to meet with these partners for the first time face-to-face to discuss work plans, challenges, and opportunities with the LIFE Project - a definite bonus to all that took place with the NBFA conference.

California

California AgrAbility had a booth at the 29th Annual Celebration of Farmworker Day in Gridley located in Butte County. The event brought together state, county, and local agencies such as the Department of Pesticide Regulation, University of California Agricultural and Natural Resource Services, Legal Services of Northern California, and more. This event rotates between three Northern California counties each year to reach various farmworking communities.



California AgrAbility conducted outreach at the UC Davis Disability Symposium and Technology Fair on the UC Davis main campus. Staff showcased ergonomic gardening tools to students, staff, and faculty. The symposium session highlighted software applications that can be used to help those living with a disability. Otter was a well-received app that changes speech to text and was even able to pick up the speaker from quite a distance away.



Staff presented AgrAbility at the San Mateo Abilities Expo with their partner agency, Ability Tools, which brought at-home living assistive tools for attendees to learn about devices that could make day to day task easier while living with a disability. Staff was able to showcase ergonomic gardening tools while educating attendees on the risk of chronic illness caused by repetitive motion. The Bahco hand pruners were a huge hit, with many attendees showing tremendous interest in trying and purchasing the tool for their gardening activities.

Hamid Fonooni, director of the ergonomics program in the UC Davis Occupational Health Services Department, presented on ergonomics for the UC Davis Biological and Agricultural Engineering Department. He emphasized the danger of being static. Every 20 minutes a muscle does not move, the muscle essentially is cut off from oxygen and nutrients. This slowly damages the muscle which causes chronic illnesses such as



carpal tunnel. He encouraged attendees to move every 20-30 minutes, while also reducing highly repetitive motion.

Colorado



At month's end, CAP staff were invited to attend a suicide prevention listening session hosted by Rocky Mountain Farmers Union. The facilitator gathered a group of stakeholders in both agriculture and mental health services. For about two hours, staff participated in an open forum conversation about how to reach men in ag within the most rural communities. It seemed to be the consensus that male farmers/ranchers are best

approached through their women. Delivery methods such as telehealth and costs of access were discussed and seen as barriers. Cultural awareness of providers was also cited as an issue of importance. Further, the need to find local centers of influence in each community was thought to be of value. It was clear that the stakeholders that were not invited should be included inasmuch as they are funded to do this type of outreach and treatment provision piece. These parties include the Office of Suicide Prevention, the Colorado Coalition of Behavior Health Providers, the Colorado Crisis Center, and the Suicide Prevention Coalition. They will be included in the next series of meetings. Staff are hopeful that these meetings will develop deliverables that have a measurable positive impact on suicide.

Indiana

Indiana AgrAbility Rural Rehabilitation Specialist Steve Swain attended the third annual Rehabilitation Hospital of Indiana Brain Injury and Resource Facilitation Conference in Indianapolis, Indiana. The conference is a partnership of the Rehabilitation Hospital of Indiana, Indiana Vocational Rehabilitation Services, and Indiana University Health. The conference is designed to provide the latest on brain injury research, resource facilitation, and resources available for brain injuries, and to recognize VR counselors, service providers, and businesses supporting individuals with brain injuries. Indiana AgrAbility staffed an exhibit providing information on AgrAbility resources and services. Indiana AgrAbility partner, INDATA - the Indiana Tech Act Project, was recognized for its contribution and services provided for those with brain injuries. Kansas

Kansas AgrAbility (KAP) and the Western AT Access Site co-hosted Ag Demonstration Day on October 10 from 10:00- 3:00. Eleven vendors participated and 55 farmers, ranchers, and family members attended. Four VR counselors accompanied six farmers and ranchers they were serving so they had the chance to see possible equipment modifications in action. Highlighted speakers included Kathy Smith, Life Essentials, who provided



anecdotes and demonstrations of adapted equipment, and the precision agriculture team from Northwest Kansas Technical School who highlighted current and experimental uses of drone technology. A KAP customer who is operating drones from his accessible truck to check crops and cattle shared some of his own experiences. A 14-year-old KAP client volunteered to demonstrate his Firefly, a device he attaches to his manual wheelchair to save his shoulders when traveling longer distances or over more challenging terrain. Additional time was allowed to visit with the vendors and enjoy a hot lunch provided by the Western AT Site staff. Several vendors noted that they had the chance to learn how to highlight critical features of their equipment that could meet the needs of people with health issues or disabilities after visiting with KAP staff and customers. VR counselors noted the event gave them information to help them better advocate for higher cost modifications.

Twenty-six occupational therapists from northeast Kansas participated in a three-hour workshop that focused on helping patients participate in rural life after rehab hosted by Stormont Vail Hospital. KAP staff shared case studies of three KAP customers (one with quadriplegia, one with a traumatic brain injury, and one with joint deterioration and arthritis) and the solutions they used to return to their role in production agriculture. KAP staff obtained CEUs for the event with the cooperation of the KS Occupational Therapy Association.
