#### California

California AgrAbility hosted the AgrAbility Regional Workshop in Davis, CA. The conference had over 30 attendees from various states and agencies including the CA Department of Rehabilitation and Ability Tools. Attendees learned about topics such as cultural humility, farming and ergonomics, farming assistive tools, and how DOR can collaborate with AgrAbility to enable clients to farm safely. An interactive workshop on the



importance of strengthening community collaborations presented attendees with an opportunity to network and connect on a personal level. Some of the tools available at the AgrAbility and Ability Tools Device Lending Library were displayed during the conference. Tour day brought rain, but participants were able to explore a family migrant center and learn about the culture of different migrant centers and groups. Participants also got a chance to visit a couple of the UC Davis agricultural safety and engineering labs with projects researching ATV safety and co-robotics for farmworker safety.

Clinica Tepati, a free student-run clinic in Sacramento, conducted a train-the-trainer for their exercise class. In collaboration with California AgrAbility staff, a modified exercise routine, based on exercises from Arthritis Foundation, was created to help patients safely move and exercise to manage and prevent chronic illnesses such as arthritis. Three new volunteers joined the training to become trainers for their bi-weekly exercise class.



California AgrAbility staffed a booth at the Small Farm Tech Expo in Santa Rosa, CA. Hosted by Community Alliance with Family Farmers (CAFF) and Farmers Guild, the Small Farm Tech Expo was the first exposition to introduce farm technology from around the state and private industry specifically for small farmers. ## Georgia

Georgia AgrAbility staff member and engineer Kyle Haney recently received training on using 3D printers at the University of Georgia's Makerspace so that staff can print assistive technology for their clients at no cost. A 3D printer has the capability of taking a design file and printing that file out. It accomplishes this by the printer heating up plastic filament and applying the plastic in very thin layers in the shape of the design. The printer builds up the print one layer at a time until the 3D part is finished. They now have 3D printers that can print in wood and metal as well as plastic. This knowledge and use of 3D printers will continue to be beneficial as GA AgrAbility serves its farmers.

Laurie Grant and her husband, Joe, contribute to Michigan's national standing by producing Christmas trees as well as cherries on their farm. Laurie was assisted by AgrAbility to help her accommodate arthritis and allow her to comfortably continue her pruning job in the farm's orchards and Christmas tree fields.

The Michigan AgrAbility Farmer Review Panel convened in December. MSU staff presented 2017 and 2018 annual survey results. Michigan AgrAbility was very much appreciated by their clients. To incentivize annual survey returns, at the 2017 Farm Panel meeting, two panel members offered \$100 for the purchase of a gift card. A random drawing was held after the 2019 panel meeting to determine the two gift card winners. One 2019 farmer panel member offered to sponsor the \$100 gift card for a lucky winner for the 2019 annual survey return. To further incentivize clients returning the annual survey and case closing survey, discussion among panel members resulted in a decision to combine the case-closing survey and the annual survey so clients need only complete one survey form. Hopefully this change, combined with other changes discussed at the meeting, will increase the number of clients returning the survey form to permit Michigan AgrAbility to better serve its constituents.

held with school nurses and counselors who were seeking suggestions for soon-tobe graduates with disabilities, resources for healthy foods for students, and ways to prevent injuries for their students.

#### **North Carolina**

On December 3 in Greensboro, NC, NCA&T SU agribusiness and food industry management undergraduate students under the leadership of Dr. Kenrett Jefferson-Moore presented projects. #### Ohio

Ohio AgrAbility staff members have been busy presenting, planning, promoting, and collaborating this winter. Staff presented "How accessible are your events and programs for people with disabilities?" at the 2019 Ohio State University Extension annual conference. This presentation gave OAP staff a chance to promote AgrAbility to Extension educators from across the state, and to share ways to make these events and programming inclusive to all participants.

OAP held an advisory committee meeting in December and welcomed several new committee members from the rural health community, Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities, Ohio Ecological Food and Farm Association, Ohio Farm Bureau, the ADA coordinator for the city of Columbus, Ohio, and Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (Vocational Rehabilitation). Several Ohio AgrAbility farmers continue to



serve on our committee as well as representatives from the Farm Service Agency, National Multiple Sclerosis Society, the Arthritis Foundation, OSU Wexner Medical Center, and the OSU ADA coordinators. OAP staff shared an introduction to AgrAbility and overview of activities, outreach, and farmers served in 2019. Staff led committee members in a discussion of audiences that should be reached for promotion of AgrAbility services, training, and educational opportunities.

#### South Dakota - Tatanka Ki Owetu

Tatanka Ki Owetu AgrAbility Project on Pine Ridge has started to develop a wheelchair-accessible high-tunnel demonstration site at its Pine Ridge office headquarters. The team hopes to have the phase one build-out completed by spring of this year. The 20'x96' Quonset high-tunnel will showcase several different wheelchair-accessible raised growing bed styles along with some in-ground and vertical growing beds, a drip irrigation system, and a trellising system. The team designed this system to be able to be resourced locally at little to no cost for tribal farmers living in persistent poverty. The team is exploring the use of thick rubber stall mats, sourced at a local ACE Hardware store, as the hard surface inside the high-tunnel. The team initially tested these mats with three clients last year and, after making some adjustments, received positive feedback from clients about the mats improving their ability to navigate around their sites. It will also showcase an internal trellising system that will help support the high-tunnel structure in the strong Northern Great Plains winds.

In addition, a second high-tunnel on site will be utilized by the program's first full-time AgrAbility incubator farmer client for in-ground production. The Tatanka Ki Owetu Project is exploring the use of incubators as a way to address land-access and equipment-access challenges that disabled tribal new farmers face in becoming involved in agriculture. The two incubator hubs, in concert with the partnering organizations that own the land and high-tunnels, provide land and high-tunnel access for free to landless disabled tribal farmers, including new farmers on the Pine Ridge Reservation. Persistent poverty, lack of access to capital, land, equipment, and hands-on training are major barriers that tribal producers face. To assist these producers, Tatanka Ki Owetu and their partners are making innovative solutions realistic by finding the solutions in the problems. Where land access is the problem, land access is also the solution, etc.

Troy served six years as a 4-H Agent and worked as the agriculture agent and county director in Hickman County for a combined 27 years. His educational program areas focused on livestock and forage production, forestry, and providing marketing opportunities for local producers in the establishment of a farmer's market in Centerville.



The Center for Profitable Agriculture is a partnership between the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture and the Tennessee Farm Bureau Federation and assists Tennessee farmers in analyses, development, and sustainability of value-added agricultural enterprises. Value-added enterprises are those that allow the producer or grower to earn a greater portion of consumer expenditures by processing, packaging, and/or marketing crops, livestock, or other farm resources, and also includes agritourism and direct marketing ventures. CPA delivers these educational programs through presentations, farm visits, consultations, developing materials, and providing training in value-added agriculture for county Extension agents and other agricultural leaders.
