The <u>BackSaver 3 Straight Auger Mover</u> is designed to enable one person to transport a straight auger (or conveyor) unit to any desired destination by walking next to it and maneuvering the Backsaver's motorized wheel jack. The three-wheeled, 12-volt-battery-powered, remote-controlled BackSaver 3 also serves as a swing hopper mover and a lifter so that the hopper can be transported with the straight

auger and maneuvered into position.



# Texas

Texas AgrAbility and BattleGround to Breaking Ground hosted a virtual agriculture business workshop series June 23 - July 7, 2020. All webinars were recorded and will be posted as part of a virtual workshop module.

BattleGround to Breaking Ground Program applications closed July 13 for the 8th cohort of the program. Applications will be scored and 15 veterans will be chosen to represent the

8th cohort of the program. The program consists of 16 weeks of agriculture business planning education, 100 hours of hands-on mentorship, and production agriculture courses.

Texas AgrAbility and BattleGround to Breaking Ground met with the project advisory committee to garner direction for future programs going virtually and to share resources for veterans and farmers and ranchers with disabilities.

Texas AgrAbility staff hosted a virtual training for migrant and seasonal farmworker personnel with the Texas Workforce Commission. Topics covered included services provided by Texas AgrAbility, resources for farmers and ranchers with disabilities, and common assistive technologies on the farm or ranch.

#### Utah

Central Utah Resource Facilitator Connor Dyreng was recently able to assist a disabled farmer with a hay problem. The farmer bales hay in small bales and needed help moving and stacking the bales from the field. <u>More</u>

Michael Porter, the southern Utah resource facilitator, has shared his knowledge of raising rabbits with several clients who are looking for alternatives to raising cattle. <u>More</u>

Unfortunately, Utah has seen a recent spike in cases of COVID- 19, and outreach events and client visits continue to be limited.

### Virginia

Dr. Alex Leonessa and Dr. Divya Srinlvasan, program co-directors, have been working with the Partnership for Innovation (PFI) Project to provide assistive technologies to farmers with disabilities. This effort is divided over three different prongs: knee bracing, back support, and a power glove to help with grip. <u>More</u>

Farming communities in Africa, like many in different parts of the world, are disadvantaged when it comes to information and mental health services access. The COVID-19 pandemic has amplified the need to support mental health information access for these rural farming communities, <u>More</u>

AchieveKids - a non-profit in California with expertise in complex and severe developmental, emotional, and behavioral challenges - and the staff of AgrAbility for Africa held a meeting to discuss mental developmental disabilities, stress, anxiety, and depression faced by children. <u>More</u>

The staff continue to attend multiple webinars related to Covid-19 and to mental health for children and farmers to draw on a wide variety of opinions, expertise, and resources geared toward minimizing lasting impact on infants and to ensure that children not only survive, but thrive in this time as do children in other parts of the world.

Staff have been developing practical tips and solutions by working with partners in Uganda to promote farmer safety and health for rural farming communities. AgrAbility for Africa has put together an instructional manual on "how to make your own masks," <u>More</u>

#### California

California AgrAbility continues to participate in the Mexican Consulate's Health Window Provider Meetings. These meetings have served for coordination of services and collaboration between colleagues working remotely with limited opportunities to reach the populations they serve directly. The Health Window is now collaborating with a mobile clinic to provide COVID-19 tests onsite for all community members interested in getting a test.

California AgrAbility joined the AgriSafe webinar "Respiratory Fit Testing in Agricultural Communities." There has been an uptake in AgrAbility farmers and farmworkers asking about respiratory exposures and protections due to COVID-19. The purpose of fit testing is to ensure the respirator forms an adequate seal with the user's face to provide the intended protection. Fit testing can be done at the worksite with appropriate equipment.

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Workers do not need to be fit-tested if they are wearing a respirator (including some N95) on a voluntary basis. Folks being tested shall conduct a user seal check; however, a test cannot be conducted if there is any hair growth between the skin and the facepiece sealing surface. It is also important to make sure the user can see around corners and is able to go up and down steps safely with the respirator on. Check out this visual guide to wearing a respirator correctly.

California AgrAbility staff joined part one of three of the Western Growers COVID-19 Webinar Series. The webinar featured Heather Riden from the UC Davis Western Center for Agricultural Health and Safety Manager. Resources shared were checklists from the Centers for Disease Control and NIOSH Ag Health Centers for creating a COVID-19 assessment and control plans. Western Growers member Ryan Talley from Talley Farms shared stories about implementing COVID-19 protocols. At Talley Farms, located in the Central Coast, Ryan has been boots-onthe-ground to provide information to workers. He described the experience as a learning experience in which tailgate meetings have been the key to disseminating information at the field level.

Problem Solved! MSU Design Day assists another Michigan AgrAbility client and family! The MSU College of Engineering celebrates the achievements of its students by hosting Design Day at the end of each semester, where student teams exhibit their

design projects and compete for awards. All ten of the MSU engineering academic programs are represented at Design Day, including freshmen through senior level classes. Each semester, Michigan AgrAbility proposes a project to assist its clients. The spring 2020 submittal: devising a solution to manually move logs for an AgrAbility client who relies on a wood furnace for heating his home during the winter months. The ME 481 Mechanical Engineering Design Project team of Marcell

Benkes-Toth, Taylor Jacobs, Jurtis Potier, Helen Miller, and Jacob Sicelsteel, advised by Michigan AgrAbility's Ned Stoller, devised a log trough capable of accommodating logs ranging from three to twentyeight inches in diameter and ten to twelve feet in length. The team designed a mechanism that can move the log forward and backward and allows the log to be clamped and cut as desired. By hydraulically assisting the movement of the log, the amount of physical labor required to perform this important task was significantly reduced.





Problem Solved! Another MSU Design Day project was highlighted on the Michigan AgrAbility Facebook page. In Fall 2019, the design team of Zach Kraut, Danny McGrail, Patrick Floyd, Will Hahm and August Butzke, advised by Ned, developed a low-cost

solution for Lou Visser to assist in raising his large overhead

door.Lou's left arm is amputated below the elbow, making it difficult to raise the door. The team designed and installed a door opener that consisted of a pulley and bracket system powered by an electric cable winch. The motor made the door move too fast, so Lou began to just pull the chain with his one arm to open and close the door. Since the chain hoist reduced the lifting weight of overhead doors, this was much better than lifting







the door directly; but when the chain was hanging loosely, it swung away from Lou's right hand. To solve that problem, Michigan AgrAbility helped him with a \$50 chain tensioner that was installed at the bottom of the chain to keep it from swinging, but still allow it to move up and down as it is pulled by hand. The tensioner also comes with a chain latch so the door can be locked in position at any point. Lou can now open and close his door very easily without excess strain to his arm and back.

Greg Gieske is blind and has made many of his own accommodations to allow him to continue to farm. Michigan AgrAbility has also provided assistive technology to enable him to farm with less pain - specifically in the area of weed control for his plants. Prior to working with Michigan AgrAbility, Greg had to crawl on his hands and knees to pull weeds by hand. In the past, Greg's tomato plants were not supported,





the past, Greg's tomato plants were not supported, and they spread on the ground. Now, Greg wraps twine around the plant and secures it to wooden stakes to support upward growth, not only making

it easier to control weeds but also for harvesting to support the plants. Michigan AgrAbility also helped to solve the problem of weed control: Greg now uses a dome sprayer by feel to spray weeds rather than crawling on his hands and knees to pull the weeds by hand.

With summer's heat comes the chance of overheating! There is a way to cool off (besides not working...LOL). Consider the type of clothing worn... did you know there are evaporative cooling hats, dew rags, neckwear, bandanas, shirts.... You name it, it is most likely available, often for a price lower than one might think. These items are worth considering to help stay cool in the summer heat.

### Missouri

Social media update from January - June 2020:

 Missouri AgrAbility's social media posts on Facebook had a reach of 1,719, 1,783 impressions, and 192 engagements (likes, comments, shares). Of the individuals reached on Facebook, 75% were women and 24% were men, with the largest audience being



and 24% were men, with the largest audience being women ages 35-54 and men ages 55-64 (See attached graph for breakdown for all age ranges).

- Social media posts on Twitter had 26,007 impressions and 410 engagements (likes, comments, retweets)
- Social media posts on Instagram had a reach of 5,111 and 5,585 impressions.
- Photos were taken and stock images compiled to develop a catalogue of photos for AgrAbility publications, social media, and program promotion.
- A Mental Health Awareness Month toolkit was developed to raise awareness about mental health and suicide in rural, agricultural communities in Missouri. The toolkit offers practical resources to help strengthen farmer and rancher resilience with coping mechanisms to maintain balance and protect their mental health.

o As part of the campaign, staff shared a video from one of their clients, Carey Portell. Within 48 hours of sharing her video about disabilities and mental health, nine new clients reached out to Missouri AgrAbility for assistance.

#### Ohio

To sustain and grow collaboration between Ohio AgrAbility (OAP) and Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD - the state vocational rehabilitation agency), Ohio AgrAbility staff met with several OOD supervisors earlier in the summer to review policies and procedures, vocational assessments, and future training opportunities for OOD and OAP. Topics included developing in-person farm visit protocols for OOD counselors across the state who focus on AgrAbility clients, assessment tools, open lines of communication, what OOD does and does not want to see in assessments, building rapport, educating supervisors and counselors about agriculture, and streamlining the process to clarify how OOD & OAP rural rehabilitation coordinators write and read assessments. Another outcome of the meeting was clarifying roles, discussing more OOD training for counselors and vendors, and making training available to new counselors.



Ohio AgrAbility collaboration with OOD, and how it benefits Ohio farmers, was a popular topic on Ohio AgrAbility's Facebook page in late June. Rachel Jarman, rural rehabilitation coordinator for OAP, posted pictures and a short caption: "Ohio AgrAbility worked with Opportunities for Ohioans With Disabilities to help Kane get this Action Track Chair and a few other pieces of assistive technology. This assistive technology will allow Kane to keep farming



for years to come!" As of noon July 2, the post had reached 10,689 people, with 1,701 engagements, and 45 shares! For Ohio AgrAbility, that qualifies as a viral post, and we are proud of Kane and Rachel for bringing so much positive attention to Ohio AgrAbility.

#### Utah

Central Utah Resource Facilitator Connor Dyreng was recently able to assist a disabled farmer with a hay problem. The farmer bales hay in small bales and needed help moving and stacking the bales from the field. With help from Vocational Rehabilitation, Connor was able to obtain a piece of equipment called a grapalator, which is used with a skid steer or tractor. The grapalator is able to pick up and stack 10 bales at a time. See the video here.

Michael Porter, the southern Utah resource facilitator, has shared his knowledge of raising rabbits with several clients who are looking for alternatives to raising cattle. Michael raises rabbits himself and says raising rabbits in a colony-style setting is less time-consuming and usually more profitable than raising them in cages. Colony-style pens allow the rabbits to move around and eat freely, but they must be adequately protected from predators.

#### Virginia

Dr. Alex Leonessa and Dr. Divya Srinlvasan, program co-directors, have been working with the Partnership for Innovation (PFI) Project to provide assistive technologies to farmers with disabilities. This effort is divided over three different prongs: knee bracing, back support, and a power glove to help with grip. A prototype is almost ready for testing with the first phase of testing delayed by the COVID-19 pandemic. The final functional device will be available commercially.

Dr. Srinlvasan has been creating a global research collaborative network called HARVEST with experts in agriculture technology. The goal will be to identify specific issues within global agriculture rather than solving those issues. Network development has been delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, as HARVEST requires much international travel.

#### **AgrAbility for Africa**

Farming communities in Africa, like many in different parts of the world, are disadvantaged when it comes to information and mental health services access. The COVID-19 pandemic has amplified the need to support mental health information access for these rural farming communities, and to fill the gap the staff of AgrAbility for Africa are working to increase distribution of this important information to people who need it through low-literacy information handouts and mobile communication messaging. This is intended to help the farmers, ranchers, farmworkers, and their children cope with social isolation and its effects in terms of both business and mental wellness.



By educating them on identifying the signs and symptoms, encouraging them to seek help when they need it, and sharing where to find that help, AgrAbility for Africa can promote the positive mental health of vulnerable people and communities who are struggling at this time. Staff are also responding to the increased number of calls for help with mental health and domestic violence prevention, calls precipitated by the restrictions meant to control the spread of the coronavirus.

AchieveKids - a non-profit in California with expertise in complex and severe developmental, emotional, and behavioral challenges - and the staff of AgrAbility for Africa held a meeting to discuss mental developmental disabilities, stress, anxiety, and depression faced by children. Special focus was on the worsening situation caused by the pandemic. Pandemic countermeasures that lead to social isolation have deprived some children of the opportunity to connect, learn, and play, unless they have the luxury of digital solutions and tools that are safe. Such things, which aren't available to many children in Africa, include monitored online games, social media, and video chat programs that provide opportunities for children in other parts of the world to connect with each other, learn, and play with their friends, parents, and relatives, while at home. Discussions centered on bridging the digital divide, recognizing and addressing the uniqueness of the condition of the children in Africa, children's developmental disabilities, parenting during COVID-19, and children's mental health support in times of isolation.

Staff have been developing practical tips and solutions by working with partners in Uganda to promote farmer safety and health for rural farming communities. AgrAbility for Africa has put together an instructional manual on "how to make your own masks," to guide farmers, ranchers, and children in making their own protective masks as a means to help minimize the danger of infection to themselves and their families.
