National AgrAbility Project News

The U.S. House of Representatives included AgrAbility in its agricultural appropriations bill at level funding for FY 2021. The Senate has yet to finalize its agricultural appropriations bill.

The AgrAbility Virtual State Fair (VSF) is coming October 1! Current participants include 17 funded SRAPs, 2 affiliates, and the NAP. Look for coming details about how to promote the VSF, and check the current schedule plus more information here.

Due to continuing issues surrounding COVID-19 and guidance against gathering in large groups, the AgrAbility NTW scheduled to begin on Nov. 30 is being



cancelled. Unfortunately, the Madison Concourse Hotel is not able to guarantee that it will be able to host a group of AgrAbility's size in November/December. Dane County is still under a mandate for groups to be under 10 people and hotel staff do not feel that that will be changing much in the near future, as their infection count is still rising.

The NAP hopes to plan some smaller regional events and some virtual events over the next 12 months. Toolbox Spotlight



The <u>WeWALK Smart Cane</u> detects obstacles above chest level with an ultrasonic sensor and vibrates when these objects are near. It alerts users if there are low hanging trees, traffic signs, poles and other obstacles. It has mobile applications for both iOS and Android, and users can save favorite places and get turn-by-turn and clockwise navigation through the cane while the phone is in a pocket.

Lincoln University's Innovative Small Farmers Outreach Program (ISFOP), in collaboration with the University of Missouri, has been busy throughout the month of July.

Missouri AgrAbility level II assessments have begun to take place in a virtual manner. ISFOP staff with members of University of Missouri Extension Missouri AgrAbility program are using cell phones and tablets to video conference Missouri Division of Vocational Rehabilitation and Rehab Services for the Blind vocational counselors while on-farm.

Additionally, field staff are outfitted with appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) such as facemasks, face-shields, gloves, and hand sanitizer to ensure their safety and the safety of their Missouri farmers.

Texas

Texas AgrAbility and BattleGround to Breaking Ground finished hosting a virtual agriculture business workshop series on July 7. It was a series shared from June 23 through July 7, and each webinar was recorded and has been posted as a part of a virtual workshop module.

BattleGround to Breaking Ground applications were due July 13 for the selection of Cohort 8. Applications have been scored, and new participants have been accepted and will begin their participation in the program towards the end of August.

Utah

AgrAbility of Utah did two online AgrAbility trainings for vocational rehabilitation districts during their monthly staff meetings. The first one was for the Provo VR district on July 21 and included 22 counselors and staff. The second training was for the Southern Utah VR district on July 28 and included 17 counselors and staff.

AgrAbility of Utah attended the Cache Interagency Council monthly meeting on July 27 and gave a brief presentation about AgrAbility. The Cache Interagency Council is an association of service programs and nonprofits in Cache Valley. They meet monthly for presentations and networking.

Virginia

AgrAbility Virginia staff are working on a farm financial stress assessment tool, a best practices resource for managing farm financial health and wellbeing, and a resource titled "Managing Farm Financial Stress for a Healthy Farm and a Healthy Farm Family" in collaboration with the Virginia Cooperative Extension Farm Safety, Health, & Wellness Initiative.

AgrAbility Virginia is supporting the development of a farm emergency planning resource developed in partnership with the Virginia Cooperative Extension Farm Safety, Health, & Wellness Initiative. Staff anticipate its publication in August.

Staff are working with the Department of Veterans Affairs to develop their relationship and outreach to five incubator farms. VA promoted the July WSAP webinar and WSAP presented a webinar about AgrAbility through the VA network on August 7.

WSAP staff have been attending several webinars hosted by other states and using NAP links for new staff training.

Wisconsin

August 2020

Alaska

Alaska CES received a grant from AARP to develop adaptive growing areas where environmental modifications can be displayed for planting and harvesting of food. This demonstration area will be built using universal design principals. The site will be used to instruct learners how to pick sites with the least hindrances for ambulation and mobility difficulties, how to use landscaping and sloping to avoid outside stairs, and the planning and dimension sizing for wheelchair-friendly growing boxes, etc. Considerations will be given to shade, rest stops, and safety communication concerns. There will also be instruction on how to build accessible cold frames, hoop tunnels, and trellises that allow for residents to plant, weed, water, and harvest their produce. There will be an emphasis on modification of tools and existing structures. This particular grant-funded project will be located in the Matanuska Valley at the University of Alaska Experimental Farm. Collaboration with the AgrAbility project will take place to educate the general public and market AgrAbility to agricultural workers.

California

California AgrAbility staff joined Migrant Clinician's Network for "UPDATES: Working in the times of COVID-19. Protecting vulnerable workers and their families," a webinar held in Spanish for promotores. Dr. Eva Galvez spoke on disparities in the Hispanic communities where many are essential workers. She also spoke on the differences between cleaning and disinfecting and the importance of having an action plan should someone in the family fall ill. The webinar closed with an overview of the vulnerabilities of agricultural producers and workers: living conditions, transportation of work crews, food access, stress, anxiety, and lack of mental health resources.

California AgrAbility staff members have been participating in weekly meetings with the Yolo Promotores Network to join efforts in providing community members with direct connections to support them through this evolving pandemic. The working group is currently planning a webinar for Spanish speaking promotores on the topic of COVID-19. AgrAbility staff have connected farmworkers to their local public health offices, community clinics, and testing sites. Staff have advocated for accommodations at worksites for farmworkers at field and processing sites. They have also



distributed to farmers and farmworkers COVID-19 toolkits to inform them about safety precautions.

California AgrAbility staff joined the "Promoting Mental Well-being for People of Color within the Realms of Environmental Health and Safety" webinar from the Blacks in Safety Excellence (BISE) common interest group in the American Society of Safety Professionals. The webinar gave an overview of concepts of mental illness and psychological safety, risk factors contributing to mental illness, including those in the workplace, and factors and components that should be considered in promoting psychological safety in the workplace. Psychosocial factors and hazards can be implemented into the "Plan, Do, Check, Assess Cycle." Psychological hazards are known to have a powerful impact on organizations and individuals, and include lack of psychological support, lack of physical safety, psychological demands and other chronic stressors. These highlight the importance of partnering with mental health providers and resources to keep employees safe.

California AgrAbility is staying informed on the effects of the pandemic on agricultural communities in order to collaborate with other boots-on-the-ground organizations and effectively conduct outreach during these times. The *COVID-19 Farmworker Study* provided preliminary results from the California surveys. Highlights included data showing that Monterey county farmworkers are three times more likely to become infected when compared to workers of any other industry. Due to the collapse of the foodservice demand, farm work is becoming more competitive. Families have lost 50% of their incomes as one parent has to stay home with the children due to school closures, and the increase in food prices has impacted the farmworker food basket. This study includes a wide array of farmworker advocacy groups, many of which collaborate with California AgrAbility. It is these collaborators which support reaching farmworkers in different areas of the state during the cancellation of typical in-person outreach efforts.



Colorado

Last month, Colorado AgrAbility reported on its IT challenges. Staff would also like to point out that their two farm site assessors are just a bit still in the dinosaur age. All of the newer IT tools are not intuitive for them, so they really have to make an effort to adopt and use them. Colorado is a very rural state. Staff can put 600-700 miles a day on the work vehicle to see just one client. That forces them to think out-of-the-box in order to spend that time wisely. COVID has challenged them to be creative and think in directions never even broached before. A serious problem in Colorado for delivery of service is lack of bandwidth and internet connectivity. Staff have been required to research those issues before deciding on how to deliver their service recommendations. Offering to send materials by email won't work for many clients. Recommending telehealth for stress reduction, etc., will not work in many spots of the state. Having a high level quadriplegic client be able to access a pasture by getting him up into a combine in a bed lift and assuming he/she can use a cell phone to access help if a problem occurs in the lift is not realistic when they may be one hundred miles from cell service. CO AgrAbility needs to think about satellite phones.

So, the effect of these experiences over the past few weeks has resulted in changing how staff deliver education. They have always delivered 5-8 Winter Workshops by setting up a location in a given area of the state and traveling to it and delivering an in-person four-hour presentation. To make proper use of time, staff tried to also cobble site visits around their travels. It usually worked OK but not always. For the 2020/2021 workshops, staff are going virtual. Staff will, as before, contact Extension agents in the remote corners of the Colorado plains and mountains and ask them to host a workshop in a location that they know will get internet reception for PowerPoint presentations and live internet-based delivery of the training. It will then be archived on YouTube so that staff can share the links by phone or snail mail so that folks can view it at a location in their community or a neighboring one.

AgrAbility for Africa

AgrAbility for Africa, Sonoran UCEDD (University Centers for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities -the University of Arizona), and Arizona Sonora Border Projects for Inclusion (ARSOBO) in the past weeks have been involved in talks to address disability rehabilitation care gaps that are entrenched within the African health care system that have resulted in chronic failure to support rehabilitation care and access to assistive technology for people with disabilities.

Discussions have been centered around evaluating current systems of care, and they inform the development of a comprehensive care model to meet the needs of individuals with disabilities as a way of strengthening systems. The partnership is looking at replicating the patient engagement model of ARSOBO across Africa - providing assistive technology devices made by individuals who use them, starting out in Uganda. Under the arrangement, local capacity will be developed by training local AgrAbility for Africa clients under transitional employment support, to produce wheelchairs, prosthetics, and hearing equipment that benefits their entire community. Later evaluations will have the purpose of scaling-up interventions that achieve measurable and significant health improvements in other parts of Africa.

Further, the partnership is exploring ways to increase early childhood intervention programs to address developmental disabilities. Among them is the Africa disability digital platform meant to connect families that have children with disabilities to life-changing resources, experts, and professionals around the world, enabling the entire world community to become more responsive to Africa's disability agenda and to needs in the different corners of Africa.

In reaffirming its commitment to the disability agenda in Africa, ARSOBO will be donating three Rough Rider wheelchairs to AgrAbility for Africa, and staff are in the processing of identifying the beneficiaries according to the ARSOBO usercentered assistive technology development design process to assess their needs before the wheelchairs arrive.





The AgrAbility for Africa staff teamed up with Ned Stoller, an assistive technology professional with the Michigan AgrAbility Project, to design and donate a Bi-Crawler to Agnes Nabawanuka in Uganda. The BiCrawler is an assistive technology device that helps people who cannot crawl or use their legs to work along the ground in fields, gardens, and flower beds. People in developing countries can sit on the platform to access latrines. It is made by welding bicycle wheels to a rebar frame with a wood platform. Click here for the BiCrawler Use

In efforts to advance the organization's mission to connect people with disabilities to life-changing resources, staff are seeking to catalyze significant advances in strengthening health systems by developing partnerships that will design, implement, and evaluate models of care that link implementation research and workforce training directly to the delivery of integrated primary healthcare in Uganda and other parts of Africa. The goal is to enhance the quality of rehabilitation care and support to individuals with disabilities while at the same time increasing local community knowledge and skills around evidence-based

strategies for patient engagement and activation as a means of strengthening disability services and care in Africa under the community-based rehabilitation care model.
