California

Georgia

Staff presented on their work at the USDA/NIFA National Food Safety Outreach Program Project Director's Meeting on August 19, 2020. AgrAbility in Georgia has a project teaching military veterans about produce food safety utilizing the universal design for learning framework.

A staff member was elected to serve on the steering committee for the National Farmers Union. A meeting was held on August 20.

Many of the farmers that AgrAbility in Georgia works with manage their businesses by using QuickBooks. Staff attended a QuickBooks webinar on August 26 to gather knowledge on the software so they can assist farmers with questions and problems that they may encounter.

Staff attended a webinar on August 31 through the UGA Small Business Development Center titled "Marketing Your Georgia Grown Product through E-commerce." Staff will use the information shared in the webinar to help their farmers who have been asking about different ways to sell their products. Georgia Grown is one of the premier marketing strategies of agricultural products in the nation.

A staff member presented at a teleconference with the Alternative Loan Financing Loan Review Board to educate about what AgrAbility does, the history of the program, and how the project works with the loan program.

A staff member trained in the Michigan State University Communicating with Farmers under Stress curriculum offered a third webinar (rather than a live workshop) on September 2. This program was for ag professionals to help them identify signs of stress in producers, use techniques for approaching someone in distress, and learn where to access resources that are helpful for someone experiencing stress.

New Mexico

<u>Gale Barber, Bedford County farmer</u> and TN AgrAbility client, passed away August 27. He will be missed! He lived with Parkinson's disease and dementia and farmed 100 acres of beef cattle and hay with his son Jason, who is legally blind. <u>More</u>

Texas

Texas AgrAbility conducted Battleground to Breaking Ground Cohort 8 Basic Training on August 27 and 28. There were a total of 23 participants with sessions that included ag

safety, business planning, agriculture career opportunities, and goal setting.

Utah

On Aug. 11, AgrAbility of Utah staff gave online AgrAbility training to the Utah Center for Assistive Technology (UCAT). UCAT is a statewide resource offering information and technical services to help people with disabilities identify and obtain the technology that will help them become more independent in their lives.

AgrAbility of Utah staff gave two online AgrAbility training presentations to two vocational rehabilitation districts in August. The first one was for the central Utah office and was attended by 18 counselors and staff on August 25. The second one was August 26 for the eastern Utah district and was attended by 13 counselors and staff.

Virginia

AgrAbility Virginia is developing an outreach strategy for high school ag teachers and college students as schools return to classes during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Staff are developing material for the Virtual State Fair where the SRAP will be highlighted on October 16th.

Washington

Washington State AgrAbility Program (WSAP) offered an AgrAbility and veterans workshop through the Washington State Department of Veterans Affairs on August 7 where 18 people participated from across the state.

WSAP gave a presentation at the Skagit County Farm Bureau meeting August 11 with 12 participants.



While maintaining social distance, staff conducted a field day style presentation and demonstration of AT at the Growing Veterans farm in Lynden, Washington, on August 19 with 18 participants while maintaining social distance.

United States Congressman Rick Larsen met with AgrAbility staff on August 19 to learn about the program and its effect in Washington. His aides asked the WSAP staff to continue to update them on AgrAbility's outreach.

WSAP is working with Skagit DVR to coordinate activities that support farmers and farm workers in assessing appropriate resources.

Staff continues to work on virtual fair ideas and content for the Washington state showcase.

WSAP staff continues to work on building their lending library based on specific injury sectors and is updating the website with the lending library component.

Wisconsin

Wisconsin AgrAbility has been busy with virtual meetings, sharing information with its NRCS Wisconsin partners and participating in the new Farmer Veteran Coalition WI chapter and its VA FARMs advisory council.

Most recently, AgrAbility of WI hosted a farm stress webinar with their partners at UW Madison Division of Extension. Lori Zierl from Pierce County shared what the emotional toll of farm stress does and some strategies to help create resilience to stress can be. Staff have recorded this webinar and will have it on their website for viewing soon.

California AgrAbility staff co-hosted the "Virtual Promotores Meeting: Our well-being in COVID-19 times" via Zoom. The effort included various community agencies helping promotores to sign up for emails and become familiar with the Zoom platform. California AgrAbility staff participated with an announcement about program services and the program's current activities to support essential workers. Participants learned about mask use

and care, family bubbles, and practicing social distancing at work and at home. The day also included an afternoon session with mental health programming information and an overview of resources to help farm working parents to support their children as they are returning to school virtually. Some daycare spaces will continue to be open for farmworker areas. The webinar was well-received, and a second webinar session was requested by participants and presenters.

Staff participated in the San Fernando Valley Promotores Virtual Conference. This year the conference theme was "Knowing the past to understand the present and where we are headed." The conference featured sessions such as best practices to help working parents with the virtual back-to-school effort, self-care through life, and COVID-19 resources and experiences. The virtual room provided a space for attendees to share their experiences during this pandemic. California AgrAbility staff presented their experience on staying open during the pandemic and how they are working to support essential workers on farms.

California AgrAbility joined the monthly Health Window Providers Meeting with the Health Education Council. AgrAbility staff have been working with this group to promote their COVID19 text information line with AgrAbility Program participants. The text information line provides testing site information for 24 northern California counties. The text information line connects directly to the Health Education Council office where its personnel have been referring farmworkers to AgrAbility for services.

Maine

UMaine Extension has created a bi-weekly Victory Garden for ME video series - short, pre-recorded videos geared towards Mainers growing their first vegetable garden. On August 13, Ellen Gibson and Leilani Carlson presented "pain-free gardening," sharing information about how to plan a day in the garden, proper stretching and lifting techniques, selecting ergonomic tools, adapting existing tools to improve their ergonomics, designing a garden to match one's abilities, and much more. As a follow-up to this video, Ellen Gibson presented an hour-long webinar about pain-free gardening, ergonomics, arthritis, and AgrAbility on August 31 as part of the UMaine Extension Summer Series.



With the pandemic limiting in-person activities, Maine AgrAbility's Brie Weisman (OT), recognized the need for OT students to gain experience. Staff developed a Level 1 virtual experience for OT students. It is a list of educational activities and opportunities available to students that can be conducted virtually with guidance from an AgrAbility professional. Staff have worked with one student so far and gotten positive feedback.

Richard Brzozowski has started a fact sheet working group comprising SRAP members from across the US. The goal of this working group is to create a fact sheet collection with a searchable library of relevant topics for AgrAbility audiences. Meet Dwight Carpenter! Dwight is the owner of Carpenter's Greenhouse and Produce. He was diagnosed with a brain tumor in 2000 and decided to change over from bedding plants to hydroponic tomatoes. He was sleeping one night and woke up with an idea to save his back and shoulders from aching due to lifting and lowering the tomato plants. It worked but was a bit inefficient. At a farm show several years ago, Dwight met Ned Stoller from Michigan AgrAbility who, working with Michigan Rehabilitation Services, installed six Lower and Lean machines in his greenhouse. Easterseals Michigan helped out with a gas-powered sweeper when Dwight shared the shoulder strain encountered while sweeping. Dwight shared his experience about his disability, the transition to a different crop and, with Ned, his experience with Michigan AgrAbility. Check out Dwight and Ned's video here!

In the June 2020 e-note, Michigan AgrAbility highlighted Ned Stoller's contributions to the instructables website that hosts a platform for individuals who like to make things (like Ned does!) and encourages community members to explore the site and share projects so others may benefit from them (Ned certainly fits this!). The projects on the website also include written instructions, photos, and videos needed for making the project. New to Ned's instructables page (here) is the BiCrawler. The BiCrawler assists individuals who cannot crawl or use their legs to work along the ground in fields, gardens and flower beds. People in developing countries can sit on the platform to access latrines. It is made by welding bicycle wheels to a rebar frame with wood platform. Ned Stoller's instructables page contains the video about the BiCrawler and directions for assembly of this inexpensive assistive technology. You can also view the video on Michigan AgrAbility's YouTube channel.



Michigan AgrAbility staff continue their educational outreach efforts by continuing to post assistive technology ideas to make farming jobs easier for their Facebook visitors. Examples include the Livestock Mineral Tub Sling, the Blaux Personal Fan, the WeWALK Smart Cane, and Warren Eicher's (a Michigan AgrAbility client) installation of steps on his harvest equipment to make entering and exiting the equipment easier, safer, and less painful, while

"Learning to relax is not easy after spending a life in the military. Hopefully, I've taken away a few lessons on my own to just be in the moment." Charly Jordan started farming after a 28 1/2 year career in the Army. Dagger, his service dog, helps him with farming and his PTSD, and is a great companion. He is passionate about supporting other veterans in agriculture. Follow his adventures and cameos from Dagger, Charley's service animal @Jordanfarmstn.

Welcome to Clay Summers who was hired at Agricenter International in Memphis, TN, as the Veterans Employed in Technology and Service in Agriculture (VETSA) program manager. VETSA will help meet the demand of a shrinking agriculture workforce by bringing veterans' leadership and technological skills to the agriculture space and finding new "missions" at home. Differing from other programs that encourage veterans to start farming, this program will prepare veterans for a variety of careers related to the agriculture industry. Participants will begin their training by going through a two-week "agriculture boot camp" orientation that will be offered on a bi-annual basis at Agricenter International, the University of Tennessee-Martin or the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture (UTIA). The boot camp will be modeled after the Tennessee New Farmer Academy developed by Tennessee State University Cooperative Extension and will include topics such as careers in agriculture, farm business and marketing basics, agricultural production practices, assistive technology for farmers with disabilities, and workplace safety. The VETSA program will coordinate with the TN AgrAbility program, a national initiative that aids farmers and ranchers with disabilities, including disabled veterans. The program will be kicking off in the near future so please share with anyone who would be interested in enrolling, additional information, or helping in another way. On August 19, the AgrAbility for Africa team was invited to join in a conversation by Chaeli Campaign, a social justice foundation in South Africa focused on changing society's views of the capabilities and role of children with disabilities. Staff joined in the Impact Story Initiative to enhance the effectiveness of their social inclusion mission, to improve the quality of client



engagement, and to build expertise in mobilizing communities and groups to respond to and support the transformation of lives of children with disabilities.

The conversation helped the AgrAbility for Africa team improve their communications and interpersonal connections through learning about different personal engagement approaches, inclusive activities, and programs.
