wide at their base, these rake-shaped, lightweight plastic tools have hand-hold grips that also support the lower arm.



State and Regional AgrAbility Project News

Alaska



The Alaska AgrAbility team is still under restrictions related to COVID-19 and not able to perform in-person assessments. More

In recognition of Emergency Preparedness Month, a four-part series of workshops was offered virtually September 28-October 1... <u>More</u>

The Alaska AgrAbility team is planning for a virtual quarterly eNewsletter that will be sent out broadly and to clients. The first edition will be sent out the first part of October.



Southeast Alaska Independent Living Center hosts the virtual Acquired and Traumatic Brain Injury Group once a month. Staff attended and discussed different assistive technology and funding options available for individuals with disabilities.

Tori Gingras, outreach specialist with ATLA, attended planning sessions for the AgrAbility national virtual fair taking place in October. Alaska is excited to be a part of this opportunity.



ATLA has received a grant from the Department of Health and Social Services for a new program called TechAbility. This program provides free lifetime loans to Alaskans who are Mental Health Trust Authority beneficiaries. <u>More</u>

During the time of COVID, ATLA is meeting with individuals over distance on platforms such as Zoom. They have also partnered with local disability support agencies to provide a demonstration kit. This allows for individuals to explore devices while on a Zoom call with an ATLA specialist.

California

California AgrAbility conducted outreach at the Madison Migrant Center in Yolo County. Although the migrant centers are closed to the public, limited access is available for agencies petitioning to bring in resources for the farm-working families. <u>More</u>



Staff joined the virtual RISE collaborative Zoom meeting. This was the first virtual RISE meeting since the pandemic started, and it is expected to continue virtually for the next year. <u>More</u>

California AgrAbility participated in several National Farm Safety & Health Week webinars hosted by AgriSafe. <u>More</u>

Colorado

September was a lackluster month for Colorado AgrAbility where outside interest is concerned. Staff made a few site visits and attended some webinars. However, they did do a lot of work on the Virtual State Fair. <u>More</u>

Georgia



Jacqueline Jacobs, an intern from Fort Valley State University (1890 university), has been doing on-site visits with AgrAbility staff. She is obtaining a Master of Science degree in rehabilitation counseling. Staff are excited to have her as part of the AgrAbility team.

Georgia AgrAbility staff returned to conducting on-site visits with farmers and ranchers during September. With this change, many farmers and ranchers had received equipment that needed installation on various farms across Georgia. Staff are following strict COVID guidelines.

With assistance through Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation, several Georgia farmers received assistive technology equipment this month. A cattle farmer and military veteran received Ghost Control automatic gate operators, an Arrowquip portable cattle working system, a gaspowered T-post driver, and rear-view cameras for his tractors.





A cotton farmer received a Life Essentials truck-mounted lift and GPS autosteer technology for his tractors, sprayers, and cotton pickers. By incorporating GPS autosteer, the farmer will now be able to run his equipment more safely and efficiently. It will also decrease fatigue and input cost.

Dr. Glen Rains recently co-published an Extension article on chainsaws titled <u>Chainsaw</u> <u>Chains and Bars</u>. To make the right choices for the job, a saw operator should be aware of the cutter type, pitch, gauge, and cutter configuration when purchasing a chain or a chainsaw.

Indiana

Steve Swain, Indiana AgrAbility rural rehabilitation specialist, was an expert presenter on "Practical AT Assessments" for Dr. Brad Durestock's graduate class at Purdue. The class was presented virtually and recorded for class members to access at a later time.

Steve Swain also continued to answer questions and acquire equipment quotes for VR counselors, supervisors, and clients.

Kansas

Kansas AgrAbility and Kansas Rehabilitation Services (VR) are working on digital training for new VR counselors. In the meantime, KAP staff conducted virtual regional trainings for the Kansas City metro area, a thriving area for small producers. <u>More</u>

Referrals to KAP staff have increased since March despite Covid19 trends in the state. Virtual training appears to be effective in maintaining collaborative relationships and increasing service authorizations through the Provider Agreement.

TN AgrAbility had helped a 46-year-old farmer with back issues that had resulted in back surgery, neuropathy/foot drop, and arthritis. <u>More</u>

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
Alaska



The Alaska AgrAbility team is still under restrictions related to COVID-19 and not able to perform in-person assessments. In anticipation of limited in-person engagement in the future, on September 11 some of the AK AgrAbility team participated in dinated by non-profit partner Assistive Technology of Alaska

PPE training coordinated by non-profit partner Assistive Technology of Alaska (ATLA) to gain more insight into appropriate and required protective equipment.

In recognition of Emergency Preparedness Month, a four-part series of workshops was offered virtually September 28-October 1 on the following topics: preparing for disasters, disasters and the home, responding to disasters to include resources for elders, mitigating damage, and resources for readiness such as using the *Alaska Emergency and Disaster Homeowner's Handbook* recently published by AK AgrAbility PI Art Nash in collaboration with Alaska Sea Grant.





ATLA has received a grant from the Department

of Health and Social Services for a new program called TechAbility. This program provides free lifetime loans to Alaskans who are Mental Health Trust Authority beneficiaries. Starting in March 2020, the delivery service of the TechAbility program had to be reimagined in a very short time. In the last four months, ATLA has qualified 152 Alaskans and provided

distance delivery service and equipment to 68 of those.

To qualify for TechAbility, an Alaskan need to be identified as a mental health beneficiary in at least one of the following categories:

- Chronic alcoholism
- Alzheimer's Disease or related dementias
- Developmental disabilities
- Mental Illness
- Traumatic head injury resulting in permanent brain injury

The qualified applicant would receive a call from an assistive technology (AT) specialist who would conduct a consultation to determine the AT that would best meet their individual needs and could be provided through the program. Once the AT has been determined, the selected equipment is sent to the applicant. Follow-up services will also be provided to ensure best use of the AT equipment.

California AgrAbility conducted outreach at the Madison Migrant Center in Yolo County. Although the migrant centers are closed to the public, limited access is available for agencies petitioning to bring in resources for the farm-working families. AgrAbility and colleagues from the Promotores Network were able to leave informational brochures, masks, and hand sanitizers for the families with the housing manager. A total of 82 families are currently living in the center.



Staff joined the virtual RISE collaborative Zoom meeting. This was the first virtual RISE meeting since the pandemic started, and it is expected to continue virtually for the next year. Attending organizations shared their experiences as they continue to provide and even expand services during the pandemic. AgrAbility shared highlights about program services, the device lending library, and upcoming webinars for promotores. Resources for Independent Living has provided five batteries and tool kits for individuals with disabilities in the community.

California AgrAbility participated in several National Farm Safety & Health Week webinars hosted by AgriSafe. The week started off with a webinar on tractor safety and the topic of ROPS. This webinar showed social media clips of agricultural equipment accidents such as ATV rollovers and scenes of children riding machinery with family members. The presenter spoke about the heightened need for safety, especially in these times where unsafe behaviors are portrayed to massive audiences via social media. The week continued with a webinar on mental health innovations and topics such as mental health views across different cultures and ethnicities. The webinar also touched on the importance of having a suicide prevention hotline for farmers that is more culturally responsive to the kind of stressors farmers face. AgriSafe closed NFSHW with a presentation on back pain in America. About 80% of Americans experience back pain at some point and it is second only to the common cold as the most common cause of lost work time.

in a vehicle accident and sustained injuries that required him to use a wheelchair. Undeterred, he has been farming from his wheelchair for over forty years! Doug is a member of the Michigan AgrAbility farmer advisory panel and an AgrAbility client. Michigan AgrAbility is grateful for Doug's generosity to share his life's learning and his farmstead so others can benefit. The goal of the October 14 event is to allow Michigan Rehabilitation counselors to see the tools and equipment and, hopefully, to increase their understanding of farming and agriculture.

Daniela Martin Pereira). Michigan AgrAbility was the project sponsor and Ned Stoller worked closely with the AgrAbility design team. The team focused on designing and manufacturing an "Automatic Gate Opener," an automatic gate opening system that could easily be installed on a wide variety of gates and could be used by agricultural workers across Michigan and the U.S. The gate opener consisted of an actuator connected to the gate and was operated by a push-button similar to a garage door opener.

TN AgrAbility had helped a 46-year-old farmer with back issues that had resulted in back surgery, neuropathy/foot drop, and arthritis. He is a livestock producer, and sitting in the

tractor seat for long periods of time wore him out. With his neuropathy/foot drop, the tractors steps were a hazard for him. With the assistance of K & M's knowledge of steps and seats, this farmer has a

new seat and steps with handrail for his John Deere tractor. The TN farmer said, "I know the seat will save what is left of my back. The steps will keep me from falling and messing something else up. It was a pain in the tail with these leg braces, trying to step up and twist sideways. Now I can just walk straight up."



"Every Farmer Counts" - This was the theme for the 2020 National Farm Health and Safety week. TNAP staff promoted and participated in the informational webinars from Agri-Safe Network, The National Education Center for Ag Safety, and Progressive Agriculture Safety Days. Thank you for the very informative VA AgrAbility webinar, "Spotlight on the Farm Safety, Health, and Wellness Toolkit for Managing Farm Stress and Mental Health." Progressive Agriculture Safety Days focused attention on disability awareness. Did you know that often the biggest barriers people with disabilities encounter are other people? Watch this "Daily Learning Drop" share ways to educate youth about this topic during Progressive Agriculture Safety Days. Progressive Agriculture Safety Days also featured a "story hour" each night during National Farm Health and Safety Week. These are very good to watch with younger children. Another resource that was promoted by TNAP was the safety online materials at Agricenter International.

AgrAbility for Africa

Following the easing of targeted sector lockdown restrictions due to COVID 19, the AgrAbility for Africa staff are beginning to renew farm visits to assess the impact to farmers. The re-connection is meant to guide intervention programs and activities to ensure effective project implementation by analyzing potential barriers and farmer needs caused by the pandemic. The situation has certainly had negative effects on the health, social, and economic aspects of their lives. It is essential to have clients be a part of the solution by actively engaging them in strategies that are geared towards improving their quality of life and boosting their productivity



Among the first farm visits was one to a thriving Lake Victoria waterfront mulberry farm owned by Mr. Arthur Blick ,Senior. Despite being confined to a wheelchair since 1983 following a bike racing accident, Mr. Blick has remained positive, and has recently started adding value to his mulberry fruit by producing wine. To date, he has been using his bare hands, but is looking at mechanizing the process in the future to accommodate

increased fruit production and to meet certification requirements for his sweet and dry mulberry brands. Due to Africa's meteorological cycles, the crop has five agricultural cycles when grown in Uganda, as opposed to one or two agriculture cycles when farmed in Europe and other parts of the world.

Finding unconventional solutions and interventions has helped the AgrAbility for Africa staff create new ideas and solutions to enhance the quality of life of farmers, ranchers, and children in Uganda, and has helped farmers faced with disabilities rebuild and return to a fairly independent lifestyle that is more flexible and meaningful. That success is largely credited to collaborations and the ability to make complex tasks simple - benefits unlocked by scaling low-cost assistive technology solutions to farmers with disabilities. AgrAbility for Africa staff, realizing the benefits, have sought the expertise of Dr Therese Willkomm, "Assistive Technology MacGyver," of the Assistive Technology in New Hampshire program, to deepen their knowledge in creating and fabricating these solutions. As part of the process, AgrAbility for Africa has received donations of her publications *Assistive Technology Solutions in Minutes*, to support the skill and capacity development of their entire team, and to help in increasing client satisfaction. By ensuring quicker solutions to farmers' challenges, AgrAbility for Africa will help alleviate the problem faced by clients of having to wait too long for significant aid.
