The step flips up and down with a rope and stays in place while driving. (Those who don't need the extra step can simply leave it





folded up, stepping on it in place.) The online instructions include a list of supplies needed as well as the text and pictures on how to make and mount the step.

Staff has been filming the spring cotton planting of a client that received a GPS unit through Georgia Vocation Rehabilitation Agency. The client is already seeing the increase in efficiency that the unit can provide him.

Staff attended the Western Regional Agricultural Stress Assistance Program Networking Quarterly Meeting. It was great to hear about all of the wonderful work that the program is leading.





Indiana AgrAbility, the Indiana Chapter of the Farmer Veteran Coalition, and Hoosier Uplands Economic Development Corporation hosted a full-day, in-person workshop for military veterans interested in farming and agriculture on April 7 at Purdue's Feldun Agricultural Center near Bedford, Indiana. North Carolina



The Washington State AgrAbility Project (WSAP) team is constructing a Pathway to Services resource and has provided various entities with a survey and initial inquiry to learn about each other's services. As a result, a coordinated effort to serve Native American farmers and ranchers is underway in partnership with the WSU Tribal Extension liaison.

WSAP has been working with six veteran farms throughout the state and learning how they work as well as how AgrAbility can help. Staff will be making farm visits with a pop-up booth at each location to demonstrate lending library tools.

WSAP has purchased a comprehensive assistive technology lending library for Ferry County, one of the most remote parts of the state and country. This will increase availability and accessibility of AT for farmers and ranchers in eastern Washington.

WSAP ordered masks with the program logo as well as silicone inserts to enhance breathability (low-cost AT solution) for distribution to farmers and farmworkers across the state.

Wisconsin

AgrAbility of Wisconsin held a successful 2021 Virtual Summit with 50 total participants and 30 participants attending on each of the three days. They learned more about FSA programs, farmer health insurance, and how the Wisconsin Farm Center can help with farmer wellness and financials.

As staff looks towards summer, they hope to be able to get back out and see more people in person and attend a few upcoming events.

California

California AgrAbility staff attended the California Foundation for Independent Living Centers virtual conference, "CA Coming Together," hosted by Ability Tools. Keynote speaker Alex Ghenis spoke about impacts of climate change on agriculture and individuals with disabilities. He emphasized that most assistive



technology can be connected to climate and disability in some way, and all new climate-related technologies must be accessible. Presenters from MyndVR, Triumph Foundation, FREED, and Disability Resource Agency for Independent Living (DRAIL), among others, led workshops highlighting topics such as assistive technology for connection and companionship with individuals living in assisted living communities, assistive technology for aging in place, and recycling, reusing, and refurbishing assistive technology tools.

Staff attended the UC Davis Western Center for Agricultural Health and Safety monthly seminar on the topic of "Workplace Sexual Harassment Among (WSH) Men and Women Farmworkers in California, USA, and Michoacán, Mexico." The seminar was presented by Kimberly Prado, a fourth-year epidemiology PhD student at UC Davis. Kimberly provided a background on WSH, an occupational hazard among farmworkers, and discussed her research among farmworkers in the United States and in Mexico. Focus group findings show that a significant number of women and men farmworkers are frequently exposed to workplace sexual harassment. The study's recommendations included rapid training for new hires and enforcing consequences. Ms. Prado's work also served to inform the UC Davis Western Center for Agricultural Health and Safety's education and outreach efforts on this topic. The center created the Sexual Harassment Prevention pocket accordion that has been distributed throughout California.



California AgrAbility attended the 11th AgrAbility National Training Workshop virtual session, "Tips for Aging Farmers and Ranchers." Speakers Richard Brzozowski and Brie Weisman of Maine AgrAbility led an interactive seminar in which participants shared tips for working with aging farmers and ranchers,

addressing physical, psychological, medical, and economic factors. Richard and Brie aimed to provide participants with a better understanding of effective ways to work with aging farmers and ranchers, and resources about aging-related resources. Throughout the seminar, a list of tips for aging farmers and ranchers were compiled to be distributed to attendees.

CO AgrAbility was fortunate that with Conner and Megan's openness and availability, opportunities were quite broad, and staff were pleased to provide them more than a single in-person site visit. They were able to observe assessment, participate in follow-ups, and tour farm equipment.

Megan and Conner were able to meet with farmers and get some close experience with several farm animals, including newborns. The focus was on mental health, and many area and national resources were shared with the interns. This was a very new experience for these two young women, and they reported they really enjoyed their time and learned from the experience.



Maine

University of Maine Cooperative Extension and Maine AgrAbility were recently awarded an Extension Risk Management Education Grant to support their Boots-2-Bushels (B2B) program. B2B is a comprehensive nine-month market gardening education and training program for military veterans, their family members, and farmers with disabilities in Maine. The program includes ten weeks of subject matter instruction and six months of hands-on production. The B2B program uses the "Five Fs" framework (Farming, Family, Finances, Future, Fitness) to address production, marketing, financial, and human sources of agricultural risk, and creates a near-peer cohort that fosters unit cohesion in an empathetic, therapeutic environment. The 18-month ERME grant will provide support for hands-on field work at a demonstration farm in 2021 and 2022, intensive individual follow-up in both years, and instruction and fieldwork in 2022.

Most recently, B2B farm students had their first field trip to King Hill Farm in Penobscot, ME, to learn about harvest and storage, including its wash and pack building.



During April, staff used outreach efforts to engage new audiences in Maine, including sharing resources with Native American tribes and commercial fishermen. Brie Weisman, OT, has started a monthly news post to the *Commercial Fisheries News* publication. The March 2021 article introduced FishAbility, a program of Maine AgrAbility, and the April 2021 issue focused on fishermen and back pain.

Michigan AgrAbility staff continue their educational outreach efforts by posting assistive technology ideas to make farming jobs easier for their Facebook visitors. Examples include:

 A Fabric Raised Bed in the field or inside the greenhouse can increase yields, reduce weeds and other pests, improve soil condition, conserve water, and lengthen the growing season. In addition, it can be reconfigured and relocated. The fabric that forms the bed is a flexible, heavy-duty pond liner material, which reportedly neither leaches chemicals into the



ground nor absorbs them from the surroundings. Included with the fabric is a supply of two-foot-long, galvanized-steel ground posts to be located every five linear feet. Configuration of the bed is determined by how one places the posts. Limitations addressed by product: Lower extremity, strength/endurance, back.



A 50- or 100-gallon capacity Utility Vehicle Sprayer and Flat Fold Boom, which mounts in the back of a pickup or utility vehicle, can be used to spot-spray fields/pastures, spray cattle or transport water. It can also supply a 10', 14', or 20' Flat Fold Boom that mounts in the vehicle's receiver hitch. It comes fitted with a Flojet Quad pump (operating off the vehicle's

electrical system). The unit includes the tank, pump, hose, spray gun and hose wrap. The boom is equipped with spring breakaways and nozzles on 20" spacing.

3. A customizable Snip-N-Drip Soaker Hose System designed for raised-bed as well as in-ground gardens allows one to apply water only where it's wanted. Setting up the system involves: (1) cutting soaker hose to fit the selected garden bed areas, (2) cutting the garden hose to run between the selected areas.



the garden hose to run between the selected areas, (3) then snapping the fittings together. The soaker hose's 'weeping action' is designed to deliver water right to the roots with minimal evaporation or runoff. The System kit includes 50 feet of 1/2-inch soaker hose, 25 feet of 1/2-inch garden hose, a faucet adapter, a quick-connect coupler, eight hose couplers, and an end cap. Limitations addressed by product: Lower extremity, upper extremity, strength/endurance, back.

injuries in farmers and farm workers. The information is used to plan educational activities and set priorities regarding specific types of injuries and geographic parts of the state to emphasize prevention programs to reduce the number of injuries in the agricultural sector. The data is also used to make referrals to the Michigan AgrAbility program. The Occupational and Environmental Medicine Division at Michigan State University prepares periodic reports on work-related farm injuries in Michigan. - 4. Promoting grain bin safety and selection of safe mask protection during the Stand Up for Grain Safety Week, an annual outreach effort hosted by the National Grain and Feed Association (NGFA) and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Cole Camp, MO, was excited to welcome two of the Peterson Farm Brothers (https://petersonfarmbrothers.com/) to share about farming and faith at the Jaycee Gardens on Thursday, April 22nd. Hailing from Central Kansas, they are known for their popular musical parodies lifting up agriculture and farm life. MU Extension Missouri AgrAbility in partnership with the Farm and Ranch Stress Alliance Network team disseminated AgrAbility and behavioral/mental resources before, during, and after the Peterson Farm Brothers concert.

Missouri AgrAbility in partnership with the Farm and Ranch Stress Alliance Network team also hosted its first Q.P.R. (Question, Persuade, and Refer) online Gatekeepers training April 21. Key components covered included 1) How to Question, Persuade, and Refer some who may be suicidal. 2) How to get help for yourself or learn more about preventing suicide. 3) The common causes of suicidal behavior. 4) The warning signs of suicide, and 5) How to get help for someone in crisis. All QPR participants received a Gatekeepers behavioral/mental health toolkit specific to Missouri that also includes resources for Missouri AgrAbility.

April 1, Governor Mike Parson joined the Governor's Challenge to Prevent Suicide among Service Members, Veterans and their Families, a partnership through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). The Governor's Challenge is designed to provide intensive technical support and assist states in implementing best practices around suicide prevention for service members, veterans, and their families. "Although Missouri has already begun to implement suicide prevention efforts, participation in this initiative will allow us to further implement best policies and practices and advance our suicide prevention efforts for service members, veterans, their families, and all Missourians," said Governor Parson.

As part of this initiative, Missouri has developed a team to ensure cross-agency collaboration. Members of the state team include Legislators and representatives from Department of Mental Health, Missouri AgrAbility Project, Missouri Veterans Commission, Department of Higher Education and Workforce Development, Department of Social Services, Department of Corrections, University of Missouri - St. Louis: Missouri Institute for Mental health, American Legion - Missouri, St. Louis VA System of Care, Missouri Office of State Courts Administrators, Missouri Coalition for Community Behavioral Healthcare, and other community providers.

State-based assistance for durable medical equipment can come from one of three types of programs (excluding Medicaid). There are Assistive Technology Act projects, protection and advocacy programs, and non-Medicaid (state-funded) nursing home diversion programs. Tennessee Technology Access Program accepts donated medical equipment and low-tech items so that TNAP can give away and loan the items to people with disabilities who cannot afford them.
