# National AgrAbility Project News

# **Toolbox Spotlight**

Connected to a battery- or gas-powered multi-tool power-head, the <u>Handheld Rotary Broom Attachment</u> is designed to sweep away dirt, sand, snow, mud, water, etc. from hard surfaces (even debris from lawns) quickly and with less strain on one's back and shoulders than would a manual push broom. It generally consists of a 1- to 2-foot-wide, 10-inch or so-diameter, nylon-bristled or rubber-finned broom.



# State and Regional AgrAbility Project News

#### Alaska

The Alaska AgrAbility team gave presentations to the Access Alaska Traumatic or Acquired Brain Injury Peer Support Group, St. Mary's Episcopal Church Caring Ministries group, and the Older Person's Action Group meeting. Each group showed interest in the AgrAbility program, either for themselves or loved ones, and wanted follow-up and referrals.

On May 6, over 60 Extension agents participated in training on rehabilitating farmers and ranchers. This is the first time staff were able to utilize their new mobile learning lab, which enables them to take trainings directly to groups across the state. More

On May 1, Georgia AgrAbility held a volunteer event for a farmer who experienced a back injury. During the time of rehabilitation, the client's greenhouses had fallen into disrepair. The local FFA chapter sent six students to participate in the day. More



### **Kansas**



KAP staff participated in design and implementation of a University of Kansas BREAK (Biomedical and Rehabilitation Engineering Advancement in Kansas) program through a student engineering capstone design project that was tasked with assisting a KAP client to improve his ag production by independently taking water out to grazing cattle and filling water tanks. More

The 2021 Four State Farm Show was the first large event that KAP staff and folks from the surrounding states have attended in many months. Show attendees were happy to cruise the show and visit with KAP staff, who demonstrated an adaptive rifle mount, riding saddle, and hand tools for the shop and garden. More



#### Maine

Kelley Spencer and Lani Carlson presented AgrAbility 101 via Zoom for the Maine Vocational Rehabilitation counselors from the western region of Maine on May 19. Pharm to Farm, a Missouri AgrAbility partner, and UMKC School of Pharmacy have published electronic educational brochures for Missouri AgrAbility clients to educate about safe use of medicine on the farm. More

Missouri AgrAbility Project was highlighted as a partner by MU Extension health outreach specialist Chiquita Chanay who shared about resources and programs for Missouri farmers and ranchers during an Interprofessional Rural Health Panel for 35 student pharmacists enrolled in the rural health & agromedicine course at UMKC School of Pharmacy. More

Kelly Cochran, PharmD, BCPS, a Missouri AgrAbility partner, shared about partnerships to enhance farmer access to pharmacist services and highlighted collaborations with Missouri AgrAbility Project and University of Missouri Extension when teaching 25 health professions students at University of Iowa and 35 pharmacy students at University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Pharmacy for their respective Rural Health & Agricultural Medicine courses. More

Pharm to Farm and UMKC School of Pharmacy have developed podcasts for AgrAbility clients. More

Pharm to Farm and UMKC School of Pharmacy are collaborating to plan a rural health screening to serve over 200 individuals in an agricultural community with MU Schools of Medicine and Nursing as an Interprofessional Clinical Rural Immersion program. More

Lincoln University's Innovative Small Farmers Outreach Program (ISFOP) MO AgrAbility events in May included developing storyboards, shooting videos, and taking pictures for several SMART technology e-publications for farmers and ranchers with physical disabilities.

An update on the Heroes to Hives Program was shared at the BIA-MO Networking Coffee in Springfield, Missouri, on May 20 with professionals in healthcare, rehabilitation, and community support services. This update included the fact that nearly 300 veterans, many with brain injury, are participating in the Heroes to Hives program that began in March 2021.

### Nebraska



The Nebraska AgrAbility team is pleased to announce that after a two-year process in coordination with Nebraska Farm Bureau, LB 380 has passed in the Nebraska Legislature! LB 380 will provide \$300,000 a year for the next two years specifically to be used for assistive technology for Nebraska farmers and ranchers with disabilities. More

Staff lined up an Action Trackchair demonstration for an AgrAbility client. This chair showed him so many ways that he could continue to be useful on the farm after a double lower amputation. More

Staff were busy working on the SRAP data information for the national team. During this time, the team started to further discuss better tracking systems. The team continues to search for one that will be the perfect fit (e.g., successful AgrAbility project practices, grants received, awards, training conducted).



#### **North Carolina**

May 1,NC AgrAbility Partnership participated in the Keeping Them Safe workshop. More

Beatriz Rodriguez presented the webinar "Como Prevenir Lesionarse" (Preventing Injuries) at the IHM International Club Learning Series in High Point, NC, May 15. Fifteen participants had the chance to learn, ask questions, and receive resources from NC AgrAbility.

The "Phase 1" course is now open and covers agriculture business basics, funding sources, resources for farmers and ranchers, a farmer/rancher panel, and rural business ideas. The course will be available to the public this summer.



Texas AgrAbility migrant & Hispanic farmworker coordinator Ellie Gandara-Castillo recorded an introduction to AgrAbility video in Spanish. The video will be uploaded to the Texas AgrAbility YouTube Channel and used to promote Texas AgrAbility to migrant and Hispanic farmworkers.

### Utah

AgrAbility of Utah was able to provide online training to the staff of Roads to Independence on May 19. Roads to Independence is one of six independent living centers in the state and they provide services to Weber, Davis, and Morgan counties in Northern Utah.

On May 24, AgrAbility of Utah staff attended the Cache Interagency Council's hybrid meeting and explained the mission of AgrAbility. The goal of the Cache Interagency Council is to unite nonprofits and community service organizations in sharing ideas, upcoming events, and ongoing services, thus producing a spirit of unity and cooperation among the participating organizations.

# Virginia

AgrAbility Virginia is currently working with 20 farmer clients at various levels of engagement and need, including a cattle farmer with cerebral palsy in Bland County. AgrAbility staff will be helping install an automatic gate opener for the farmer on Monday, June 7. The gate opener was purchased using a \$700 Easterseals UCP Bellows Fund award.

AgrAbility Virginia just finalized a brochure in Spanish and will be printing and disseminating it this summer. A version of the brochure is available on the <u>website home</u> page.

A draft of the 2021 AgrAbility Virginia program evaluation is being reviewed by the AgrAbility Virginia team before publication in June.

AgrAbility Virginia Program Coordinator Garland Mason is currently compiling data for the Y3 AgrAbility grant submission.

AgrAbility Virginia plans to attend the Sunbelt Ag Expo in Moultrie, GA, being held October 19 -21.

AgrAbility Virginia is working with a high school volunteer on projects including a publication on ableism in agriculture for youth and a fact sheet on AT for diversified vegetable growers in Virginia.

# Washington

The Washington State AgrAbility Project (WSAP) team continues to construct a Pathway to Services resource and has provided various stakeholder groups with a survey and initial inquiry to learn about each other's services. An added result of this work is a coordinated effort partnership with the WSU tribal Extension liaison to serve Native American farmers, ranchers, and fishers.

WSAP is attending as many events, fairs, and field days this summer as are deemed safe and appropriate by Washington State University. The first of many is a three-county youth livestock sale June 4-5.

WSAP continues working with six incubator farms run by the WA Department of Veterans Affairs. Staff will be making farm visits including pop-up booth visits at each location with demonstrations of lending library tools.

WSAP's partnership with Ferry County Extension began with their lending library officially open for checkout. Staff are working to update their website and lending library policies and procedures so they are available online.

WSAP team members will have a table at Farmworker Health and Safety days throughout the summer. Run by SeaMar Health Clinics, these on-farm events allow for one-on-one interface with farmworkers where WSAP will highlight low-cost or DIY tool modifications and AT solutions.

Staff received notice that the WSAP article titled "Washington State AgrAbility: Building a New Extension Program During COVID-19," has been approved and is published in Vol 3 issue 13 by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA). <u>Click here</u> to read the article.


# **AgrAbility for Africa**
