Toolbox Spotlight

A <u>Personal Air Quality Monitor</u> is a handheld or wearable battery-powered unit that tracks, measures, records, and transmits surrounding atmospheric condition data to one's electronic device (e.g., smartphone, computer). It warns workers with respiratory impairments if they are entering a dangerous environment for their lungs. The user can then, in real time, read the results (even be audio-alerted) and take protective action, if warranted.

Alaska

January into February has had Alaskans facing exceptional weather events throughout the state, from freezing & thawing to extreme wind events being referred to as "winter hurricanes." In some parts of the state, thousands were without power for several days, and roof collapses happened due to excessive snow loads. Some farmers are concerned about their crop insulation and what the spring will bring for the next production season. While 2022 has been a rough start up North, everyone is looking forward to spring and more daylight as the days are beginning to get noticeably longer.

While waiting for spring, the Alaska AgrAbility (AKAgrAbility) team has been active in doing some outreach and educational events and planning for the coming season. As mentioned previously, the AKAgrAbility program has partnered with the Kenai Peninsula Soil & Water Conservation District (KP-SWCD) Office to offer a seven-part series titled "From the Ground Up," which is currently underway. Extension staff and faculty as well as other partner organization experts from NRCS, FSA, and the Division of Forestry, have come together to bring practical information for those considering growing a business this coming season. This virtual series has been quite popular, showing a demand for information of this kind. Three hundred people registered for the Zoom series, which was the maximum allowed, causing a waitlist to be formed. Those who cannot attend the live session are being sent the recording of the live session the day following.

DeShana participated in two convenings around food systems and food security in Alaska. The first was initiated by a volunteer organization in Anchorage that formed out of the pandemic called "Anchor Gardens," where education and outreach is at the heart of getting resources to people around the city to grow their own food. The second was sponsored by the Alaska Food Policy Council through a grant from USDA that was engaging leaders in food systems work to assist with mapping assets and priorities for the Anchorage area's local food system. Both of these sessions were very engaging and offered a great opportunity for AKAgrAbility to be represented at the table.

Indiana AgrAbility staff will provide advice and recommendations as needed when the club decides on a project.

A highlight of the evening was a visit by Remmy, an eight-monthold black lab being trained by a member's family to be a leader dog for the blind. After spending about one year with the family, Remmy will undergo further training and then be matched with a visionimpaired individual.

Transferring fuel can be strenuous and messy. These AT suggestions may help address these barriers. Fuel Transfer Pumps as Assistive Technology

Starting in February, Maine FishAbility will be providing fishermen virtual access to stretching poses to help them stay productive and avoid injury. Suggestions for strength and conditioning specifically for fishermen will be shared to encourage better health and minimize injury and pain. These exercises and stretches are intended to be done using gear that is readily available on the boat or dooryard (what Mainers call the area immediately adjacent to the front door of a house) and performed easily while in the wheelhouse or on the deck. This effort is a partnership of the Maine Coast Fisherman's Association and UMaine Cooperative Extension's Maine AgrAbility program, working to address the physical needs of fishermen and the business of fishing. To address the specialized need of Missouri customers and their families, Brenda Schreck, Joni Harper, Elizabeth Picking, and Karen Funkenbusch assisted farmers and ranchers by helping them with product selection advice, accessibility and ergonomics recommendations, life activity and farm operations planning guidance, and advocacy to obtain services and financial aid. Direct assistance also occurred by meeting with farmers directly on their farm or remotely via electronic means such as by webcam, Teams, and Zoom.

The Missouri AgrAbility Project (MAP) is currently working to offer its third behavioral education-based workshop to agricultural professionals in a series focusing on mental health and farmers with disabilities. The first training workshop took place in-person at the Lincoln University Carver Research Farm in Jefferson City, Missouri, on October 15 with the focus on a



curriculum called "Weathering the Storm". The second training class took place December 9 and focused on "QPR Gatekeeper" training. Lastly, a more in-depth training will take place February 17to enable staff from the Lincoln University Innovative Small Farmers Outreach Program (LUCE ISFOP) and partner staff members to complete "Mental Health First Aid". The purpose of these training workshops is to connect LUCE ISFOP staff and the Missouri partners with behavioral health educational tools and mental health resources in their toolbox to better serve AgrAbility customers and their families throughout the state of Missouri.

Forty-three veterans with brain injury recently completed the Heroes to Hives (H2H) online course offered by Michigan State University and the Missouri State H2H Chapter's face-to-face



and hands-on program. H2H is a unique program offered through Michigan State University and the Missouri AgrAbility Project. The H2H program seeks to address financial and personal wellness of veterans through free professional training and community development centered around beekeeping. Missouri veteran students understand the importance of

pollinators in U.S. agriculture and stand to protect managed bees through small-scale, sustainable beekeeping operations. The H2H online course has nine modules which include pre-recorded lecture videos, articles, and quizzes. The online course also is self-paced, allowing students with disabilities to review course materials at their own pace and on their own schedules. There were no live or synchronous sessions. The Brain Injury Association of Missouri, in partnership with Missouri AgrAbility, will offer all veteran beekeepers with disabilities information, support, and direct on-the-farm technical assistance related to the effects of their disabilities plus ways in which to successfully maintain their beekeeping operations. Nebraska

Ohio

Ohio AgrAbility (OAP) staff presented at the Ohio Land Improvement Contractors Association (OLICA) annual conference in early January. This was the first opportunity to present to this group in several years, and they were an attentive audience. In addition to an overview of Ohio AgrAbility, OLICA attendees were also introduced to OAP's "Fitness for Farm Life" resources and encouraged to try ten different stretches during the presentation. OAP staff are grateful to former NAP and Indiana AgrAbility OT doctoral intern Luke Cain for introducing OLICA to OAP after he presented on AgrAbility at the national Land Improvement Contractor's conference.

Tennessee



TN AgrAbility presented for a new online learning opportunity: Master Farm Family and Health Wellness Program (MFFHW) is an educational outreach program coordinated by UT Extension Family & Consumer Sciences to provide farm families with the tools to cope and thrive with the unique challenges facing farm families. The first session was "Safety Around the Farm." TN AgrAbility's presentation focused on assistive technology solutions to different challenges and helping prevent secondary injuries. Brian Robinson with the TN Association of Rescue

Squads presented on safety around farm equipment, moving farm equipment, farmer first aid (shock, heat stroke, hypothermia, trauma), and livestock handling safety. This eight-week program will help producers and farm families gain knowledge while also giving them a new area of participation as they continue to find ways to include the Tennessee Agricultural Enhancement Program (TAEP) cost-share program on their farms.

One unique way that TN AgrAbility assists beginning farmers with disabilities is by encouraging them to attend the TN New Farmer Academy with TNAP's partner, TN State University Extension. TN AgrAbility offers scholarships for beginning farmers or veterans with disabilities to attend. Finis Stribling, who started the academy, is also the Tennessee AgrAbility Project director for TSU Extension. He emphasizes the



importance of utilizing AgrAbility, if needed, and all the assistive technology services available so farmers can continue doing what they love. Plus, the Tennessee New Farmer Academy is an opportunity to introduce beginning farmers to a little bit of all types of Tennessee farming with hands-on experiences. Three Tennessee New Farmer Academies across the state are now accepting new students for the March 2022 classes: tnstate.edu/extension/NFA.aspx.

TNAP also encourages farmers nationwide to attend a financial class that is another new online educational program University of Tennessee Extension uniquely designed to help beginning farmers or individuals starting a new venture in agriculture. "UT Farming Fundamentals" provides participants with resources and information on the essential principles needed to build a successful operation. January ended with the first TN Grain Bin Safety/Rescue Awareness Training for 2022. The event was coordinated by TN AgrAbility and UT TSU Extension (Chester, Decatur, Hardin & Henderson Counties) with instruction by Tennessee Association of Rescue Squads (TARS). The participants included ag producers and rescue personnel. Each one learned the roles they were responsible for in case of a grain bin entrapment.

Sponsors for the event: Goddard Family Endowment, Roger's Farm Supply, Chester County Grain, AG Services, and Faulkner Family Farm, LLC. A Chester County ag producer said: "Usually when I do have to pay a registration fee to attend a training, it is worthless. This training was great. I learned a lot, and the instructors were very professional. I have never had this type of training on grain bins and

what do to do in case of an entrapment. I am spreading the word." And according to the UT Extension Chester County ANR agent, the ag producer is still talking about the training.

Utah

AgrAbility for Africa

Wednesday, January 26, AgrAbility for Africa staff attended a webinar by Free Wheelchair Mission on mobility for the disabled in Uganda. Among the issues discussed were the challenges of access and the interventions in place to try and address the persistent problem of health, health care information, and assistive technology access for people across Africa. The wheelchair need alone in Uganda, to date, stands at over one million wheelchairs. The purpose of joining the webinar was to help validate traditional knowledge, help in identifying emerging solutions, understand real-time challenges, and monitor and track wheelchair numbers, types, and use. End-of-life management toward putting in place appropriate resources and systems was also in view, as this is fundamental when promoting the issues of access and intervention. It was also an opportunity to further learn best practices and expand networks to support AgrAbility for Africa's mission.



As the country slowly opens up past the worst phases of Covid-19, the AgrAbility staff are also returning to the fields to assess farmer needs and challenges and to provide the appropriate support. It is

during such visits that they met Nabawanuka who has mobility challenges. She is a long-term client of AgrAbility for Africa. Currently, staff are working with Ned Stoller, an assistive technology professional with the Michigan AgrAbility program and the National AgrAbility Project, to design solutions tailored to her



needs and challenges, in order to enhance her independence and quality of life.
