Toolbox Spotlight



Workers with leg, arm, and back impairments can feed calves in hutches or pastured livestock with a <u>Feed and Water</u> <u>Transport Wagon</u>. Feed and water can be dispensed directly to troughs without lifting and carrying buckets by hand. The towable wagon consists of a feed hopper and a water tank (both polyester) mounted on a rubber-wheeled steel frame with hitching tongue. Custom-built according to users' needs, hopper sizes range from .8 to 2.8 tons and tank sizes from

250 to 275 gallons. Unloading the feed is accomplished via an electric or hydraulic motor connected to the towing vehicle, while the water is dispensed via a gas-powered pump or gravity-flow through a hose.


Tennessee

Utah

The sessions will either be 25 minutes or 50 minutes long, exploring AT devices and services for people with a wide range of disabilities. California AgrAbility staff attended the 20th annual month-long Healthy Aging Education Series, part of the UC Davis Healthy Aging Initiative. The initiative is a UC Davis Health system-wide approach to expand geriatric clinical services to improve quality of life for patients 65 and older and their caregivers. This year's event was a virtual event highlighting several important topics,

such as advanced care planning, palliative care and post-acute services, difficult decisions in caregiving, depression later in life, medication management, and many more.

California AgrAbility staff met with Clinica Tepati representatives, a non-profit student-run clinic in Sacramento, California, to discuss the offering of arthritis exercise classes to clinic patients. The classes will take participants through a series of low impact exercises aimed at improving strength, mobility, and coordination. Through this partnership, California AgrAbility staff will provide Clinica Tepati health educators with the necessary materials to obtain training and certification to become arthritis exercise program instructors.

California AgrAbility staff participated in the 2022 Capay Valley Almond Festival. Staff introduced the Western Regional Agricultural Stress Assistance Program (WRASAP) and presented on AgrAbility services. The festival drew farmers, farmworkers, and other locals from surrounding communities. This year's festival is noted as an event that marks the return to in-person events. After the program presentations, attendees



toured the almond orchards. A couple of weeks every February, tree branches in orchards throughout Capay Valley appear as though they're snow-covered. The white petals creating the winter wonderland effect are almond blossoms, the delicate flowers of the namesake trees that are grown commercially in only five regions in the world, one being California's Capay Valley.

This year's event also included a new exhibit of various kinds of sheep to spur on the rising interest among the Amish in raising sheep or goats in



addition to their cows and horses.

The IN AgrAbility booth displayed a variety of AgrAbility literature, including the *Plain Facts about Arthritis: A Guide to Understanding and Living with Arthritis in Plain Communities* pamphlet and the *Weeds in Our Garden* coloring and activity book that targets safety for children on Amish/Plain farms. It was often the children being drawn to the literature that would encourage their parents to learn about AgrAbility from Steve and Chuck.

Ed Sheldon and Chuck Baldwin have been presenting AgrAbility to groups of urban BIPOC (Black and Indigenous People of Color) farmers thanks to one of AgrAbility's partners. John Jamerson, director of the LIFE Project (USDA 2501 grant) that has the National AgrAbility Project as a partner, has been working with NRCS and other USDA agencies to produce a series of one-day conferences in Indiana for these urban



farmers. The goal of the conferences is to help urban farmers see how they can benefit from USDA agencies and services.



Called the "Black Loam Conferences", four of them have been scheduled: Evansville, February 19; Fort Wayne, February 26; Gary, March 12; and Bloomington, March 19. Indiana AgrAbility staff Ed Sheldon spoke and staffed a booth at the Evansville event where about 35 people attended, and will also work the upcoming one in Bloomington. Chuck Baldwin exhibited and spoke at the Fort Wayne conference with 50 attendees and will

do the same in Gary the day before heading to the NTW.

An interesting highlight of the Fort Wayne conference was having seven Burmese urban farmers in attendance with a translator.

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Kansas



Kansas AgrAbility Project (KAP) enjoyed interacting with attendees at another Women Managing The Farm Conference in Manhattan, Kansas. Staff provided an interactive exhibit with one-hand gate latches, AT devices and tools, and a riding saddle featuring a back support. The conference was attended by over 200 women from Kansas and surrounding states.

Keynote speakers included Courtenay DeHoff, also known as Fancy Lady Cowgirl. Staff also presented during a breakout session featuring the KAP Protect, Preserve and Plan Through Change program by sharing a slide deck and demonstrating items that are helpful on and off the farm to protect the body and avoid secondary injury.

Tawnie Larson, KAP project coordinator, participated in a feature segment with Agriculture Today, the Kansas State University Radio Network, to discuss the recent

KAP fact sheet titled "Managing Stress: Tips and Resources". The interview and fact sheet were both aimed at informing those that work in agriculture that stress is a common occurrence. The tip sheet references Dr. Robert J. Fetch's "Managing Stress During Tough Times" as a resource to identify signs of stress and how to manage stress. The publication also provides local and national resources for readers to utilize for support.

Kansas AgrAbility was invited to present in the state-wide "Risk Management Skills for Kansas Women in Agriculture" series sponsored by K-State Research and Extension (KSRE) and the Department of Agricultural Economics. The program is hosted in-person by Extension agents in 30 sites throughout Kansas. Some programming is presented in-person and others via Zoom. KAP found the format helpful in presenting throughout the state without requiring travel resources. Tawnie Larson modified the KAP "Protect, Preserve and Plan through Change" presentation to focus on how making changes can mitigate risk throughout the farm, including personnel, operations, and equipment.

Maine

Maine AgrAbility currently has a master's OT student doing her 12-week, level 2 fieldwork experience with them. Corey Young, University of New England (UNE), grew up on a dairy farm in southern Maine. Corey has been creating AT bulletins to share with B2B students, including a presentation on hand health for



farmers and gardeners. Staff will be posting this presentation to the Maine AgrAbility video webpage in the near future.

2022's Boots-2-Bushels: Boot Camp for Market Gardeners and Farmers has finished the first two months of programming covering topics like safe food handling, crop planning, and small fruit and vegetable production. Each session has included relevant AgrAbility topics and AT ideas. On the B2B horizon: a seedling production farm visit in Damariscotta at Morning Dew Farm.



Maine's first month of Who's Got Your Back blog posts focused on fishing-related work tasks, counter stretches, and resources to encourage better health to minimize injury and pain. This effort is a collaboration of FishAbility, OryxWorx and Maine Coast Fishermen's Association, and has been shared widely on social media platforms to generate conversations and sharing of resources.

Staff have been busy sharing Maine AgrAbility resources to a variety of audiences: talking to OT students about AT ideas at UNE, beginning farmers as part of UMaine Cooperative Extension's "So You Think You Want to Farm in Maine?," and veterans participating in B2B sessions. Staff have also participated in meetings and shared resources with agriculture service providers working with the Farm & Ranch Stress Assistance Network in New England and Maine, including fishing and logging industry professionals.

Ohio

Ohio AgrAbility presented information on OAP services, vocational rehabilitation, and accommodating farmers with disabilities to a class of occupational therapists at Wilmington College. Wilmington College has recently started a rural-focused OT program, and AgrAbility staff are eager to develop collaborative opportunities with the program and students. In addition to giving an overview of accommodations and assistive



technology, OAP staff presented the OTs with three scenarios based on OAP farmers and asked the OTs what AT, modifications, and task-based changes they might recommend to the farmers. Students were also asked to come up with several questions they would ask these farmers about their work, farms, equipment, and disabilities or limitations. Students were encouraged to think of ways they could work with Ohio AgrAbility, such as developing OAP resources and talking points for OTs and medical professionals, and social media campaigns about safety and good body mechanics for farming.

Ohio AgrAbility, Kansas AgrAbility, and Alaska AgrAbility recently wrote a selfdetermined 4-H project publication: *Disability Advocacy and Awareness*, which has been published on the Ohio State University Extension 4-H website: https://ohio4h.org/selfdetermined

Self-determined 4-H projects are projects for members who have a great project idea of their own or who want to work beyond a current project book. Disability Advocacy and Awareness has four topic areas: Person First, Safety, Service and Advocacy, and Wellness and Lifestyle. The idea starter also includes a Person First Survey, a Community Survey Checklist, and a Greenhouse Activity.

Tara Janssen, STAR Center occupational therapist and assistive technology specialist, presented "Prevent and Preserve: Being Proactive to Protect



Your Health." The eight-week program helped producers and farm families gain knowledge while giving them a new area of participation as they continue to find ways to include the Tennessee Agricultural Enhancement Program (TAEP) cost-share program on their farms.

TN AgrAbility is working to reach new Extension staff through quarterly "Assistive Technology Tuesday" Zoom webinars. February held the first Zoom webinar. After a brief introduction to AgrAbility services, a 4-H agent asked if AgrAbility helps students with disabilities like autism find a job after school. Staff explained that they would refer students to one of their partners, the state Vocational Rehabilitation (VR). VR has services that include transition services from school to work. The student and family would work closely with a VR counselor to develop an individualized plan for employment (IPE) that outlines a program of services that leads to successful employment.

TN AgrAbility presented at one of the Progressive Agriculture Safety Days "Booster Session: Welcoming Participants & Volunteers with Special Needs". The event featured AgrAbility, and two key points were asking farmers with disabilities to be part of a safety day's planning committee and always including all participants.
