Toolbox Spotlight

The <u>Walk-Behind Tractor</u> - also called a two-wheeled or walking tractor - allows the user to perform a multitude of tasks in small areas without digging or lifting. It accommodates over 20 different attachments and is popular in high tunnel hoop houses, where farm size is small, and/or where the terrain steep and rugged. It can go where four-wheel compact tractors can't. Most makes/models come with: reversible handlebars giving it front or



rear PTO, independently engaged PTO, multi-speed forward and reverse, steering brakes, lockable wheel differential, and easy-interchange implement system.

Maine

Thirty people saw the presentation and 10s of brochures were provided to increase awareness of Maine AgrAbility's role in working with farmers with disabilities.

Survey results from Maine's Boots-2-Bushels: Boot Camp for Market Gardeners highlighted that trauma is widespread, regardless of veteran affiliation. Data suggests that B2B has a positive effect on posttraumatic stress growth and community reintegration.

Michigan AgrAbility staff are continuing to work with their farmers throughout harvest season and are currently helping a farmer obtain new equipment.

New Mexico

Staff completed the Technical Large Animal Emergency Response training course while in attendance.

Texas

BattleGround to Breaking Ground staff hosted a webinar covering the application process for a tuition waiver to cohort 13, which begins in January.

Utah

AgrAbility of Utah staff presented and answered questions about AgrAbility for the staff of Options for Independence on October 3. Options for Independence is an Independent Living Center that serves the counties of Rich, Box Elder, and Cache in northern Utah.

On Oct. 12, AgrAbility staff visited with the staff of the Confederated Tribes of the Goshute Reservation in Ibapah, Utah, and informed them about AgrAbility and gave them brochures for their office. The Confederated Goshute Tribe has over 600 members and their reservation is in West Central Utah.

AgrAbility staff visited the Northwestern Band of the Shoshone Nation headquarters in Ogden, UT, on Oct. 17 and educated them about AgrAbility and gave them brochures for their office. The Northwestern Band of the Shoshone Nation has 620 members in Northern Utah and Southeastern Idaho.

On Oct. 18-19, AgrAbility staff presented and set up a booth at the Central Utah Grazing Expo that was held at two different locations. The first day was in Richfield, UT, and the second day was in Price, UT, and was attended by many ranchers in central Utah.

AgrAbility of Utah staff presented virtually and answered questions about AgrAbility for the staff of Active Re-Entry on Oct. 26. Active Re-Entry is an Independent Living Center that serves the seven counties of eastern Utah. The seven counties within the service district include: Daggett, Duchesne, Uintah, Carbon, Emery, Grand, and San Juan.

National AgrAbility Project

The National AgrAbility Project helped staff the AgrAbility booth again this year at the World Dairy Expo in Madison, WI. Chuck Baldwin (NAP) worked there with Annie Klahn of AgrAbility of Wisconsin for a couple of days. This year's World Dairy Expo also set a new record for the number of animals housed during the event. The previous record, set in 2008, was 2,657 animals; the 2022 show housed 2,663.



The crowds were also large - 54,525 total tickets sold of which 1,375 attendees were international with the top five countries being Mexico,

Canada, Germany, Brazil, and Columbia. There were an additional 37,614 unique viewers via digital-EXPOTV with the top five viewing countries being USA, Canada, United Kingdom, Japan, and India. A full event summary can be read by clicking HERE.



One memorable moment at the AgrAbility booth came when a young boy of about 11 stopped to look at the table-top model of a tractor with a lift on it provided by AgrAbility of WI. He turned excitedly to his parents and said, "Mom and Dad! This tractor has a lift on it that could really help Grandpa get into his tractor!" The couple explained that their son worked regularly

alongside his grandpa and often had to assist the older man in getting onto or off of the tractor. However, if his grandpa fell getting down, he was too small to break the fall. They were excited about what they saw at the exhibit and took some literature, saying they would contact AgrAbility later.

consists of over1,200 exhibitors who showcase the latest in farming technology over a 100-acre exhibitor area along with a 600-acreworking research farm.



Additionally, over 300 seminars and demonstrations are offered over the course of the three-day event. Georgia AgrAbility staff spoke with many members of the farming community - not just from Georgia, but from many of the states in the

The Shepherd Center Hospital is GA AgrAbility's non-

profit partner. The hospital has started a tool checkoff program that evaluates a patient's tool use after a brain injury. AgrAbility staff helped to train therapists at the Shepherd Center on how to use power tools safely. AgrAbility also showed the therapists different adaptations that can be made to tools for the patients to continue to use them. The training was a week-long program from October 24th-28th.

Georgia AgrAbility will be hosting a tractor safety and driving workshop in Blairsville, Georgia, November 4th. The workshop will be for both new and experienced tractor operators to learn and practice safe tractor operating procedures. The workshop will include morning classroom type instruction followed by an afternoon of attaching implements, going over basic tractor maintenance and operating a tractor through a course designed to allow operators to complete various driving scenarios on a closed course with an instructor.

and Missouri AgrAbility. Brad Bell Logging, Tommi Alcorn (FNP), and Windmill Hill Farms graciously sponsored these shirts and some of the supplies needed for programs this fall. Supplies included eggs, pumpkins (used in place of watermelons

for the "Don't Crack Your Melon" activity), paper products, snacks, and more. Staff also offered two trainings for volunteers and teen leaders this past month and will host another training next week. Additionally, MO AgrAbility established partnerships with three new school districts to offer 4-H Save Your Brain over the next six weeks.



David Middleton, MO AgrAbility consultant, attended the Hermann FFA Farm Safety Day on behalf of MU Extension Missouri AgrAbility and educated 80 students on power take-off safety. He also participated in the Missouri AgrAbility/MU Extension booth at the Ozark Fall Farmfest, October 7-9. The Ozark fall Farmfest is held annually on the first weekend of October at the Ozark Empire Fairgrounds in Springfield, Missouri. With over 1,000 agricultural and rural living exhibits and more than 600 head of registered livestock on display, it has become the Ozark's largest event with over 60,000 agriculture enthusiasts in attendance over three days.

Ohio

Ohio AgrAbility staff were recently reminded of how farmers benefit from AgrAbility services and how pieces of equipment, both simple and complex, impact productivity. Ohio farmers Steve and Julie McFalls attended the Farm Science Review in September and were effusive in their praise of the new equipment Steve had received from Ohio's vocational rehabilitation agency Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities (OOD). Steve and Julie farm specialty hay. Steve's disability makes it very difficult for him to work long hours or consecutive days, and the jolting and vibration of a tractor takes



a toll on him. He has an Airhawk inflatable seat cushion that reduces the vibration and his pain. He uses the seat cushion on his padded tractor seats, and recently used the seat cushion while watching the tractor pull at the county fair. He gets great benefit from this simple piece of equipment. The complex equipment Steve uses are an accumagrapple and hay accumulator for baling hay. Julie stated that in the past, she would have to recruit people to help bale hay. Sometimes they could not get enough help, and they had to leave some hay in the field. This year Steve and Julie used the accumagrapple and were able to put up over 555 bales of hay by themselves in just one weekend. Steve reported that he did not have lingering pain and immobility from the work, and his grin lit up the whole exhibit area. Julie said if it was not for the new equipment, they would not have been able to continue farming. See the full video interview here.

AgrAbility for Africa's mission is to eradicate obstacles that limit comfort and independent living through partnerships and collaborations. Great appreciation to Duncan R. Burris - (ARSOBO), Parent-Johnson, Wendy and Hughes, and Peter T of Arizona University for the support to advance this mission through the donation of the two RoughRider wheelchairs to AgrAbility for Africa clients in

Uganda. The chairs will be passed on to the beneficiaries at no cost. With AT access challenges across Africa, it is extremely exciting news and empowering to own a wheelchair.

Across Africa, close to 100% of persons with disabilities are unemployed or are outside the work force, and those that are employed receive little or no monetary remuneration. This is because they are seen has adding little value to the organizations. Burris R. Duncan's (Sonoran UCEDD - ARSOBO) theory of change works with people with disabilities to build AT technologies for those who need them to help earn a living wage.
