

New Mexico

Equipment that will support food producers has been acquired by the NM Technology Assistance Program (NMTAP), and is already being requested by community members.

NMTAP will host a UNM OT service-learning student.

NMTAP had a table at Disability Awareness Day at the NM Capital on February 8 to highlight New Mexico AgrAbility Project (NMAP) services available for farmers.

Mandy's Farm, NMAP nonprofit partner, has installed an improved ADA toilet facility for use by employees and seven agricultural apprentices (2-3 days/week in February).

The group of apprentice food growers with disabilities will go to the NM Roundhouse (capital building) on February 8 for Disability Awareness Day.

A local restaurant (M'Tucci's restaurant in Albuquerque) has requested certain crops for seasonal specials to be grown by the agricultural apprentices.

UNM will provide three service-learning occupational therapy students to Mandy's Farm and to NM Technology Assistance Program in order to improve training of rehabilitation professionals while drawing positive attention to student projects and the NMAP. More

February 16th is Ag-fest in Santa Fe to coincide with the NM legislative session). NM Dairy Extension will have NMAP materials available to make the community aware of NMAP services available for food growers.

One prospective farm site evaluation fell through, but a training has been developed for OTs and PTs for CEU hours to inform the rehab professionals of nationally and locally available services to support agricultural workers. Upon state approval, the continuing education opportunity will be offered online to rural NM locations.

North Carolina

NC AgrAbility and Benevolence Farm staff met January 25 to explore partnership opportunities. This farm trains formerly incarcerated women in agricultural production and micro-entrepreneurship. They serve an average of 12 women a year.

Ohio AgrAbility staff worked with Hal and OOD to complete a farm assessment and advocated for AT to keep Hal farming. More


BattleGround to Breaking Ground (BGBG) hosted a five-day agriculture training bootcamp. More




Indiana AgVets, and Gearing Up for Safety presented a session on farm safety and AgrAbility.

Hal is a farmer in northwest Ohio. He and his wife operate Hopes Blessings, LLC, a therapeutic horse farm. Hal is paralyzed and was limited in what he was able to do on the farm. Ohio AgrAbility staff worked with Hal and OOD to complete a farm assessment and advocated for AT to keep Hal farming. Hal was approved for an Action Track Chair to give him access to his barns and fields. He has this to say about receiving an Action Track Chair:

"I'm very excited to be able to get in with the horses, feed them, and lead them. Also, to take the dog for a walk on the leash. I'm also excited to be able to go hiking with my family. There are very few places I can take my regular chair, and this will open a whole new world of opportunities for us."

Pennsylvania

South Carolina

The staff from Clemson met with their partner, Able SC, to discuss upcoming projects they have planned for the residents of South Carolina. The staff's first objective is to coordinate joint workshops to train Clemson and SC State members on the language and presentation of disabilities from the perspective of Able SC's long-term relationships with the disabled of South Carolina. Likewise, staff from Clemson and SC State will coordinate trips to some of the agricultural research stations throughout South Carolina. Able SC staff will be able to learn about many of the agricultural practices in the state. This exposure to some of the complexities in farm settings will help Able SC's staff inform AgrAbility staff of the challenges that people of different disabilities may experience.

Staff members are also working with students in the Department of Agricultural Sciences at Clemson University on capstone projects. One of the projects includes modifications in an aquaponics system to allow an individual to farm. Modifications include a device to easily harvest fish and elevated plant growing beds to allow a person to stand up and garden or to move low enough for an individual in a wheelchair to also garden. The other project includes modifications in a tractor cab for the operator to have visual devices surrounding the tractor so that a clear 360-degree view is achieved.

Tennessee

TN AgrAbility began 2023 partnering with the Farmer Veteran Coalition of TN to exhibit and network at the TN Cattlemen's Association Winter Meeting, "New Year, New Ideas." Thank you to Dr. Temple Grandin, an animal behaviorist and livestock handling expert, who presented information on providing correct care of cattle and safe animal handling, which is very important for the producers. She also spoke on how autism allows her to understand the behavioral aspects of livestock better.



The STAR Center, TN AgrAbility's non-profit partner, has a commitment to helping people with disabilities, like Alzheimer's, reach their full potential. In January, STAR featured ways to improve a client's quality of life with Alzheimer's through music therapy. Music offers a host of benefits for Alzheimer's patients in varying stages of the disease. Studies show music therapy improves a patient's focus, improves their ability to communicate with those close to them, and may lower their dependence on psychiatric drugs.

TN AgrAbility participated in the informational Farmer Veteran Coalition of TN funding webinar. Past Farmer Veteran Fellowship Fund awardees described how the funding assisted them as beginning farmers and explained useful tips on how to apply for the competitive grant of up to \$5,000.[BCF1] The webinar featured Jennifer Anthony-Waller, Second Harvest Food Bank of Middle Tennessee Farm-to-Families coordinator. Jennifer discussed the agreement with USDA's Ag Marketing Service (AMS) and the Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement Program (LFPA). Through LFPA, the TN Department of Agriculture seeks to purchase and distribute locally grown, produced, and processed food from underserved producers. Kelly Bumpus, Ag Launch director of product development, explained how hosting field trials on the farm can lead to a passive income stream to build wealth.



TN AgrAbility exhibited at the Tennessee Grain & Soybean Producers Conferences. TNAP's goal in participating in exhibits, field days, and trade shows with its educational exhibit is to help inform producers of any assistive technologies that are available to help them with their physical disability so they can continue farming. TNAP staff promoted TN AgrAbility programs as well as the TN Grain Bin Safety/Rescue Awareness Trainings coordinated by TN AgrAbility, TN Association of Rescue Squads, and UT/TSU Extension. Each day featured breakout educational sessions with excellent speakers.

UT Gardens, FrontLine Gardens, and TN AgrAbility held their first monthly lunch and learn session in January. Participants learned a variety of garden topics from Master Gardeners and UT Gardens staff, shared their successes, and learned from other gardeners during this informational session. TN AgrAbility presented at the first session of the 2023 Master Farm Family and Health Wellness Program during January. This is an educational outreach program to provide farm families with the tools to cope and thrive with the unique challenges facing farm families. Brian Robinson with the TN Association of Rescue Squads talked about safety around farm equipment, moving farm equipment, and handling livestock safely. Future webinar topics include grain bin safety, healthy habits to maximize mental health, medical warning signs, talking about tough topics, vision and hearing, safe livestock handling, farmland legacy, and crossing the communication gap. The series will also feature program resources that are available to support farmers. This eight-week program will help producers and farm families gain knowledge while also giving them a new area of participation as they continue to find ways to include the Tennessee Agricultural Enhancement Program (TAEP) cost share on their farms.
