Alaska

Georgia



Mental Health First Aid full-day trainings were taught to 68 Young Farmer teachers across the state of Georgia. This effort was in conjunction with Southern Region Farm and Ranch Stress Assistance Network. More

Staff provided 13 new Georgia county agents a 30-minute presentation on agricultural equipment safety resources for youth safety training. Staff also provided useful information on agricultural accident demographics, useful safety tips, and how AgrAbility can serve their counties.





On March 11th, the Meet at the Shed initiative hosted a second wood carving workshop for men in a rural Georgia community. While they were carving, the participants had a great time fellowshipping with each other. This initiative is aimed at reducing stress in rural communities.

Georgia AgrAbility staff met with the Department of Veterans Affairs' community engagement and partnership teams along with local community leaders to create community coalitions with the purpose of

establishing a resource rich, self-sustaining community support system for individuals in crisis throughout the southern Georgia counties of Decatur, Lowndes, Grady, Colquitt, and Thomas. More

Staff had a great time getting to connect with other states at the NTW. They all learned so much and came away energized to serve farmers. Thanks to Washington AgrAbility for hosting a great conference and setting the bar so high for a fun NTW!

Indiana

The Small Farms Conference, organized and hosted by Purdue Extension's Diversified Farming and Food Systems Team, provides educational and networking opportunities for those involved in small-scale, specialty, value-added, and urban agriculture. More

Maine

Staff participated in the Hall of Flags event at the Maine State Capitol to bring awareness of Maine AgrAbility and Boots-2-Bushels to state

legislators. Staff also had an engaging conversation with Governor Mills about the Boots-2-Bushels programming in particular.





Three staff members, two advisory council members, and one farmer client attended the National Training Workshop in Spokane. Major takeaways the team is committed to working on are sustainability and additional funding for client resources, helping clients with brain injuries, and developing a closer connection with veterans in other state projects.

Boots-2-Bushels held its first in-person on-farm visit at a plant nursery located in Damariscotta, Maine. Sixteen participants learned tips and tricks for starting seedlings for small-scale farm production.





Staff provided ergonomic and safety instruction to ten logger students of the Professional Logging Contractors of Maine safety school.

Michigan

Michigan AgrAbility staff presented and manned a display booth at the Michigan Beekeepers Association on March 11in conjunction with Dr. Adam Ingrao, founder of Heroes to Hives. Staff taught about setting up accessible apiaries and assistive technology for beekeeping.



Missouri

Missouri AgrAbility hosted a successful March Brain Injury Awareness Month in partnership with the Brain Injury Association of Missouri. The 2023 Brain Injury Awareness Month Promotional Toolkit, social media posts, and videoclips, all experienced a significant increase in engagements.

March 25, Missouri AgrAbility exhibited during the 99th Annual Jefferson County Agricultural Conference in Hillsboro, Missouri. Attendees tried out ergonomic small hand tools and picked up AgrAbility education-based resources, farm safety booklets, and prevention of secondary injury materials. More

Participants included the University of Missouri Extension, 4-H, Lincoln University Missouri Innovative Small Farmers' Outreach Program (ISFOP), Brain Injury Association of Missouri, a Missouri AgrAbility client farmer, and four

Elizabeth Picking, Susan Jaster, David Middleton, Willard Downs, and Karen Funkenbusch facilitated eight authorized fees for service (DESE DVR, & DHSS Rehab Services for the Blind) on the farm assessments with final report, pictures, videoclips, and quotes.

Four Lincoln University Missouri (ISFOP) team members accompanied staff from the University of Missouri Extension, Brain Injury Association of Missouri, and disabled and veteran farmers to attend the annual AgrAbility National Training Workshop in Spokane, WA.

Lincoln University ISFOP team hosted a "train the trainer" event in

St. Louis, MO, on Saturday, March 18th, for minority urban farmers, providing information on soil composition, seed starting, transplant planting, and growing mushrooms to 85 participants. Urban farmers were also provided with Missouri AgrAbility, mental health, and suicide prevention resources.



The University of Missouri Extension hosted the 99th Jefferson County Ag Conference on Saturday, March 25th, providing information to community partners and regional small farmers. Lincoln University ISFOP outreach worker Mary Bolling gave a presentation on ergonomics on the farm and provided AgrAbility programming information to 35 participants.

Missouri AgrAbility partnered with the Brain Injury Association of Missouri (BIA-MO) for the Brain Injury Fact of the Day social media campaign during March 2023, which is Brain Injury Awareness Month. A unique brain injury-related fact was posted each day on Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram, as well as agriculture, health, veteran, and other websites. More

Dr. Brent Masel, medical director for the Brain Injury Association of America (BIAA), was a featured speaker for the "Brain Injury: Chronic Health Condition, Management and Prevention" session at the AgrAbility NTW. Attendees learned that brain injury is not an event or the final outcome, but rather it is the beginning of a disease process. More

Nebraska

On March 29-30, around 6,000 Nebraska FFA members, advisors, and guests participated in the annual Nebraska State FFA Convention. Held in Lincoln, Nebraska, participants took part in numerous general sessions, competitive events, workshops focused on leadership, a career fair, and educational tours. More

Emily Jacobson and John Davis have been busy working on client visits. They are learning new tools that could potentially help clients. Emily shares that they are trying to find a resource to help a Nebraska farmer with low vision see the ear tags on cattle.

Emily said she hoped to have a great crowd at the in-person event. A virtual connection to the daylong meeting was also available.

New Mexico AgrAbility Project (NMAP) is working with the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum in Las Cruces in April to plan an adaptive farming exhibit. This may include an adapted demonstration garden and a display of different adaptive tools. The farming and ranching museum in Las Cruces is listed as a top attraction in southern New Mexico.

Several NMAP team members attended the AgrAbility National Training Workshop (NTW) in Spokane, Washington, and are both inspired and thrilled to implement their new learning.

TN AgrAbility staff spoke to 52 attendees, engaged participants with the AT tools, and gained referrals for new AgrAbility customers. It was a fun and productive day.





Tara Janssen, assistive technology specialist with STAR Center, made a farm/home visit to a Rutherford County farmer along with TN AgrAbility staff. After getting the grand tour of the farm, the group sat around the kitchen table (always the place to gather) to discuss different phone apps to help him with dyslexia. These phone apps will assist in reading drug labels, providing the correct information to the farmer as he prepares vaccinations for his cattle.

Texas

Debbie and Emily presented about AgrAbility and displayed various AT items at a farm stress training on March 29.


Debbie and Emily are working with a Washington State conference attendee to help him advance his farming operation.

Florida

Georgia



Mental Health First Aid full-day trainings were taught to 68 Young Farmer teachers across the state of Georgia. This effort was in conjunction with Southern Region Farm and Ranch Stress Assistance Network. The Young Farmer (YF) program was created in 1951 to provide educational instruction and opportunities to adults interested or engaged in agriculture, and it seeks to increase proficiency in agricultural production,

management, agribusiness, and leadership. Currently, there are 61 active YF programs across the state of Georgia. School systems apply for a state of Georgia grant to have a Young Farmer teacher. If approved, the teacher will spend 30% of his/her time working with students in the school system. The remaining 70% is as a state employee working hands-on in the community with young farmers. While they often work collaboratively with Cooperative Extension, they are a different organization with somewhat different responsibilities.



Georgia AgrAbility staff met with the Department of Veterans Affairs' community engagement and partnership teams along with local community leaders to create community coalitions with the purpose of establishing a resource rich, self-sustaining community support system for individuals in crisis throughout the southern Georgia counties of Decatur, Lowndes, Grady, Colquitt, and Thomas. Over 100 leaders from the faith community, healthcare workers, first responders, veterans, business operators, nonprofit organizations, and others attended these five sessions to discuss how they may be of continued service to their communities and how to increase overall awareness and reduce the number of suicides across the state.

Missouri

March 25, Missouri AgrAbility exhibited during the 99th Annual Jefferson County Agricultural Conference in Hillsboro, Missouri. Attendees tried out ergonomic small hand tools and picked up AgrAbility education-based resources, farm safety booklets, and prevention of secondary injury materials. Mary Bolling with Lincoln University Missouri Innovative Small Farmers' Outreach Program and Missouri AgrAbility co-PI presented "This and That - Ergonomics to Protect Yourself on the Farm," and demonstrated short- and long-handled ergonomic hand tools.

Missouri AgrAbility sent 12 delegates to the 2023 AgrAbility National Training Workshop in Spokane, Washington. Participants included the University of Missouri Extension, 4-H, Lincoln University Missouri Innovative Small Farmers' Outreach Program (ISFOP), Brain Injury Association of Missouri, a Missouri AgrAbility client farmer, and four veteran farmers.



Missouri AgrAbility also exhibited, presented during the poster session, and provided four conference breakout sessions.

Missouri AgrAbility partnered with the Brain Injury Association of Missouri (BIA-MO) for the Brain Injury Fact of the Day social media campaign during March 2023, which is Brain Injury Awareness Month. A unique brain injury-related fact was posted each day on Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram, as well as agriculture, health, veteran, and other websites. Of these social media posts, three were videos featuring Missouri AgrAbility clients through the cooperation of Karen Funkenbusch and Tevin Uthlaut with Missouri AgrAbility, and Maureen Cunningham and Andrew Edmonston with the Brain Injury Association of Missouri. Immediate results of the Facebook posts were 5,608 engagements. Nearly 24,000 people were reached through Facebook, which is a 27 percent increase from the 2022 Brain Injury Fact of the Day social media campaign.

Dr. Brent Masel, medical director for the Brain Injury Association of America (BIAA), was a featured speaker for the "Brain Injury: Chronic Health Condition, Management and Prevention" session at the AgrAbility NTW. Attendees learned that brain injury is not an event or the final outcome, but rather it is the beginning of a disease process. Discussion included that no brain injury is a static process, regardless of whether it is classified as a mild, moderate, or severe brain injury or concussion. There was also information about brain injury being disease causative or accelerative. Research shared by Dr. Masel showed the correlation between brain injury and health conditions of post-traumatic epilepsy, stroke, brain tumors, multiple sclerosis, and sleep disturbances. He also provided extensive information on the relationship between brain injury and psychosis, depression, mania, PTSD, aggression, and Alzheimer's-type dementia. Karen Funkenbusch, PI for Missouri AgrAbility, shared examples of successful AgrAbility clients and encouraged AgrAbility staff to be prepared to recognize unreported or diagnosed brain injuries that may affect other health conditions of the farmers.



With an attendance of 4,500 FFA members and

They learned about the TN Grain Bin Safety/Rescue Awareness trainings, TN AgrAbility, and the National AgrAbility assistive technology curriculum for FFA Chapters, and were able to work with and view some cool AT tools.

TN AgrAbility co-hosted with TN State University (TSU) the 2023 TSU Veteran Boot Camp in Nashville at Ellington Agriculture Center. Twenty veteran farmers took part in the three-day event. They learned about the resources available to Tennessee farmers and were provided the opportunity to tour local farms. TN AgrAbility and TSU staff met inspiring veterans who want to farm in TN, and learned about other programs



available from UT/TSU Extension and USDA. Producers were able to look at and learn about AT devices provided by TN AgrAbility and the STAR Center in Jackson. A big thank you to the TN Department of Agriculture for the use of the Ellington Ag Center. Thanks is also extended to Jordan Farms, Sweeter Day Farms, Liberty Farms, and Kennedy Farms - and to all the veteran farmers who graciously shared their stories and opened their farms to the group.

March means the start of the 2023 TN New Farmer Academy with beginning farmers eager to learn and dream big. TN AgrAbility provides scholarships to farmers with disabilities to attend annually. Ten scholarships are provided in each of the three regions of the state. This year marked the first year that farmers with hearing impairments planned to attend. To accommodate these farmers, the STAR Center recommended using the free built-in Live Transcribe (Android), or Live Captioning (iOS), or the Hand Talk app that costs approximately \$10. TNAP plans to monitor these tools to see how effectively they provide needed assistance.
