Toolbox Spotlight



Supporting the full body from beneath, the **Zeen Sit-Stand Walker** is designed to allow one to stand and walk at his/her natural pace or to sit but still using legs/feet for locomotion. It also has a leverage mechanism that can raise the user from seated to standing position. Other features of this mobility device include: coasting/parking brake, foam swiveling seat, retractable seatbelt, adjustable lift-assist, armrests with seat-height adjustment, footrests, rear caster-wheel locks, rear storage rack, and rear push handles.



Indiana



Indiana AgrAbility and Easterseals Crossroads held an Agricultural Assistive Technology Expo in mid-April. It was a beautiful day at Purdue's Beck Center where vocational rehabilitation professionals, occupational and physical therapists, extension educators, and college students majoring in occupational therapy, as well as representatives from AgrAbility projects from surrounding states (Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan,

Ohio, and Kentucky) immersed themselves in learning about farming with disabilities. The goals for the day were to have individuals who work with a person with disabilities in agriculture 1) understand a little more about different kinds of farming and what is physically required by trying it for themselves and 2) learn about several kinds of assistive technology that are used to help someone on the farm.

- Attendees climbed into equipment for themselves, such as a tractor, skid steer, and a zero-turn mower, to identify difficulties that someone with a disability might encounter. Several individuals drove the zero-turn mower in the parking lot.
- Mark Carter demonstrated his drone technology and discussed how it was helping farmers in the fields. He invited anyone who was interested to fly a drone.
- A panel of Indiana farmers (Toby Days, Ron Frazier, and Donald Lawson) discussed their experiences of being diagnosed with a disability and working with AgrAbility to find solutions to continue their farming business. Those in attendance asked questions and the panel provided very detailed answers concerning how assistive technology was implemented and made each of them more independent.
- Everyone was invited to try equipment designed as solutions for farmers with disabilities. Whether navigating an obstacle course with a Trackchair (sitting or standing), transferring from a wheelchair to a pickup truck or tractor using LifeLyfts mobility lifts, or using a personal scooter, each attendee challenged themselves to use the technology. A Roll-a-ramp (available for loan through the new loan library) helped the scooters navigate over rough terrain and climb over a step easily.
- Many toured several Purdue farming operations close by. Two thirds of the attendees visited a dairy barn, walked through the calf huts, explored a sheep/lamb operation, stopped at a grain storage facility, and learned about aquaculture in Indiana. Understanding the tasks involved in each of these operations helps to understand the barriers that exist for someone with a disability.
- Breakout learning sessions covered many topics. Steve Swain discussed the process of assessing the needs of









someone with a disability going through vocational rehabilitation. Home modifications, the new AT loan library at Purdue, the National AgrAbility Toolbox website database, underserved populations in farming (veterans and the Amish), and using AT in small scale or nontraditional farming were some of the topics discussed.



Everyone walked away with a better understanding of the need for assistive technology to ensure the success of farmers with disabilities.

Indiana AgrAbility in partnership with the LIFE Project presented and exhibited at the Gary, IN, Black Loam Workshop April 15, 2023. Approximately 70 people, the vast majority being BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color), attended the in-person event.

Led by John and Denise Jamerson, directors of the LIFE Project 2501 grant (in which the NAP is a partner) and founders of Legacy Taste of the Garden LLC, the Black Loam series of workshops are intended to build relationships, to help farmers gain access to information, and to train them in better agricultural practices. Attendees received introductions to multiple USDA programs and resources available to BIPOC and



socially disadvantaged urban, rural, and community producers to encourage increased participation in USDA programs, loans, grants, scholarships, sustainable agriculture practices, business planning, and community development.



Chuck Baldwin represented AgrAbility with a display of AgrAbility printed materials and a talk on the importance of AgrAbility for anyone involved in agriculture who is impacted by disability.

Missouri

April 10 - 14, Missouri AgrAbility co-hosted a successful Armed to Farm Sustainable Agriculture Training for military veterans in partnership with the Center for Appropriate Technology (NCAT) and Veterans Urban Farm in Columbia, Missouri. The week-long training featured daily farm tours and hands-on activities at a variety of successful farms. Participants learned from seasoned



farmers and gained direct experience on livestock, vegetable, fruit, and agritourism operations. While in the classroom, participants learned about sustainable agriculture that included how to adopt climate-resilient practices in regenerative approaches, agroforestry as a land management approach, and accessible sustainable beekeeping to address financial and personal wellness. At the end of the conference, veteran farmers reported having gained 100% new knowledge about 1) how to run a successful business, 2) marketing their products, 3) accessing USDA programs, 4) setting business goals, 5) developing meaningful mentorships, 6) managing their physical health: recognizing personal stressors and requesting information and resources for agricultural rehabilitation and vocational training for veteran farmers and ranchers, and 7) selecting ergonomic tools and anti-vibration gloves for small-scale farmers and ranchers.



Karen Funkenbusch, Missouri AgrAbility, had a great time demonstrating and discussing the Life Essentials accessible tractor lift with Ellis Vidmar of Colorado AgrAbility and Marty Cotterman of LifeLyfts by Life Essentials, at the National AgrAbility display during AOTA Inspire 2023 in Kansas City, Missouri. The Annual AOTA Conference & Expo is the place for occupational therapists to expand their knowledge, enhance

skills, and stay up to date on the latest assistive technologies and evidence-based research in the profession.
