Toolbox Spotlight



A <u>Smartphone Endoscopic/Borescopic Camera</u> can be a valuable yet relatively inexpensive tool around the farmstead (workshop, garage, home). With this technology, one can inspect small or otherwise hard-to-access areas that need repair or maintenance, e.g., vehicle engine, equipment undercarriage, electrical wiring, HVAC, sewer drainpipe. In addition to the smartphone app, some kits consist of a cable with a camera and light at one end and the smartphone connector at the other; others have more complex camera controllers.

State and Regional AgrAbility Project News

Alaska

New Mexico

NM team members are diligently planning details for the "a day on the farm" event for NM DVR workers in the fall and for the 2025 NTW in beautiful Las Cruces, NM.

North Carolina

NC AgrAbility continues to expand its impact through strategic partnerships and dedicated outreach efforts. A new partnership with Ag Mediation NC & VA, a program of Western Carolina University, has provided valuable services, including business planning, credit review, heirs' property assistance, and farm planning, enhancing our support for clients. <u>More</u>



The NC A&T agromedicine team engaged with NC AgrAbility non-profit partner Easterseals UCP on a social care farming project as a means to better understand the impact of an accessible garden site on the wellbeing of residents and staff at a resident home. Partnerships have been developed with Home Depot and Scott's to provide additional volunteers,

plants, and materials for an install. More

NCA&T researchers Crystal Cook Marshall and Sydney Davis Richardson presented on their nine-person research project on BIPOC farmer stress/anxiety, extreme weather, and leadership to 25 section attendees at the International Society for Agricultural Safety and Health (ISASH) Conference in Portland, OR, in June 2024.



Marshall and Richardson also presented on their research project on BIPOC farmer stress/anxiety, extreme weather, and leadership to 125 section attendees at the American Meteorological Society Broadcasters Communicating Extreme Weather conference in Myrtle Beach, SC June 2024.



NC AgrAbility director Crystal Cook Marshall presented on NC AgrAbility and discussed partnering with farmers on an ergonomic and/or repetitive stress reducing "toolkit" to be piloted and researched for efficacy through NC AgrAbility's current SARE grant.

Crystal Cook Marshall stocked a set of items to prevent or reduce injury to farmworkers for assessment and feedback with Vecinos, a farmworker-serving medical agency in western NC. Using a grasstops assessment approach, medical professionals advised on best interventions for farmworkers to reduce pain, risk of injury, and reduce incidence of repetitive stress. More

Crystal Cook Marshall trained farmworker health workers from Access East in Stop the Bleed, which they plan to bring to 30 producers and more than 600 farmworkers in July alone. Cook Marshall and Access East discussed additional lower costs interventions to prevent farmworker injury and will pilot a similar approach to interventions in July as that started with Vecinos in June.

Ohio

Ohio AgrAbility staff started the summer strong with outreach and AT. OAP staff presented "Gardening with Arthritis" to a variety of groups, from a garden club at a Columbus retirement residence to the American Conifer Society. <u>More</u>

Disability Services Coordinator Laura Akgerman passed the RESNA AT Professionals exam and is excited to join the growing ranks of AgrAbility ATPs. Laura was one of several SRAP staff who participated in the RESNA ATP exam preparation classes sponsored by NAP in fall 2023. <u>More</u>

Tennessee

Happy Summer from TN! Farmers are busy planting (been a wet spring) and trying to stay cool.

TN AgrAbility and UT MANAGE had a joint meeting with the Department of Human Services Division of Rehabilitation Services/Vocational Rehabilitation Program (DVR). DVR is the main state funding source for assistive technology that assists people in getting back to their work and careers. <u>More</u>

A Giles County livestock farmer with back/knee/mobility issues received a feed bin to assist with feed flow in to his UTV cake box. The feed bin and UTV cake box was funded by TN Vocational Rehabilitation Services.

Utah

Missouri

Emily Doosing, 4-H specialist and outreach coordinator with Missouri AgrAbility, continues to work on 4-H Clown Colleges in summer school programs throughout the Southeast region, including Butler, Carter, Oregon, Reynolds, Ripley, and Shannon counties. Staff are beginning to transition planning to "4-H Days at the Lake" in collaboration with the Army Corp of Engineers at Lake Wappapello. The 4-H days at the Lake Day Camp series will include shooting sports safety; wilderness survival; first aid basics; fire prevention/safety and how to put out a fire; drowning prevention; wildlife safety: snakes, ticks, and other threats; boat safety; ATV rollover prevention; poisoning prevention; grain bin safety; suicide prevention; and equity and inclusion of individuals with disabilities. North Carolina

NC AgrAbility continues to expand its impact through strategic partnerships and dedicated outreach efforts. A new partnership with Ag Mediation NC & VA, a program of Western Carolina University, has provided valuable services, including business planning, credit review, heirs' property assistance, and farm planning, enhancing our support for clients. Recent events have further strengthened community engagement: Crystal Cook-Marshall's presentation on "Agricultural Safety" and "Stop the Bleed" at Forsyth Urban Growers School was well-received by 20 farmers, while the Frontline to Farm Dinner Presentation saw 55 farmer veterans in attendance. As the project continues in its no-cost extension year, NC AgrAbility has optimized service delivery, resulting in significant client growth-currently serving 41 farmers with plans to reach 60 by summer's end.



The NC A&T agromedicine team engaged with NC AgrAbility non-profit partner Easterseals UCP on a social care farming project as a means to better understand the impact of an accessible garden site on the well-being of residents and staff at a resident home. Partnerships have been developed with Home Depot and Scott's to provide additional volunteers, plants, and materials for an install. Nine home residents, six

home staff, four Home Depot volunteers, three Scott's volunteers, four Easterseals staff, and two NC A&T Cooperative Extension staff participated in the installation of the accessible gardens on June 28.

Crystal Cook Marshall stocked a set of items to prevent or reduce injury to farmworkers for assessment and feedback with Vecinos, a farmworker-serving medical agency in western NC. Using a grasstops assessment approach, medical professionals advised on best interventions for farmworkers to reduce pain, risk of injury, and reduce incidence of repetitive stress. Efficacy will be assessed through a cohort model of farmworker feedback facilitated by the medical clinic. Results will be collated for this grant to SARE and incorporated as part of a research paper on interventions to reduce farmworker pain and ergonomic and/or repetitive stress injury.

Tennessee

Happy Summer from TN! Farmers are busy planting (been a wet spring) and trying to stay cool.

TN AgrAbility and UT MANAGE had a joint meeting with the Department of Human Services Division of Rehabilitation Services/Vocational Rehabilitation Program (DVR). DVR is the main state funding source for assistive technology that assists people in getting back to their work and careers. AgrAbility works with the DVR counselors to help guide the farmers to a successful case closure that allows farmers to continue their farming profession. The TN VR policy team received a better understanding of how the financial side for farmers looks different than financial information typically reviewed for other jobs. Counselors often review income/tax info and are looking at the financial need as well as if the work counts as "competitive integrated employment." TN AgrAbility shared the white paper or "Serving Agricultural Workers with Disabilities through State VR Services." Eryn Bell, an ag economist with UT MANAGE, recommended three resources to help with business planning and to use with AgrAbility VR farmer cases:

- Schedule F (shows profit and loss) = Past finance
- Balance sheet = shows Present finance
- Cash flow = 3-5 years expected Future finance

A case-by-case review determines if a self-employment business plan is needed with VR or if a case is viewed as retention. The financial needs assessment (FNA) is the financial eligibility component that determines if VR will pay for the assistive technology. When technology is needed to retain employment, all other avenues must be exhausted, including relevant health insurance coverages. Documentation must be provided to VR verifying all other avenues for technology have been pursued, but the financial component is still present and may require customer participation. Farmers are always eligible for TN AgrAbility/Extension services and a farm visit to evaluate their barriers to work. It was a very informative meeting. TN AgrAbility staff appreciates Kim Lilley with TN Technology Access Program for leading the way and bringing everyone together for a chance to learn from one another. TN AgrAbility has fostered connections and a wonderful team across the state who want to help farmers with disabilities and streamline the funding process. The meeting continued to strengthen the working bond between TN AgrAbility/UT TSU Extension, UT MANAGE, and Division of Vocational Rehabilitation.
