Toolbox Spotlight

Getting on/off one's skid steer can be a daunting task for those with leg impairments and/or arm-strength limitations. One possible solution is a set of **Skid Steer Folding Grab Bars**, which consists of a pull-down bar with grab handle and a permanently-affixed bar mounted side by side to the machine's both left and right forward frame. Providing the leverage to climb aboard, one hand grasps the pulled-down grab bar, while the other hand grasps the stationary





bar. Once seated, the left- and right-side pull-down bars are returned to upright position so they're out of the way when the loader bucket is raised.

State and Regional AgrAbility Project News

Colorado

The Colorado AgrAbility team, including Julie Elliott (western region behavioral health specialist), Natalie Bachmeier (AgrAbility coordinator), and Janell Pisegna (professor, CSU Occupational Therapy Department, and AgrAbility faculty), has been awarded a mini-grant to develop and implement an "Agriculture Workforce Exploration and Training Program" tailored for young adults with disabilities. More

Colorado AgrAbility team members Chad Reznicek, Julie Elliott, and Clinton Wilson have been appointed as leaders of the Agricultural Behavioral Health Workgroup. Established by Senate Bill 55, which passed in 2024, this workgroup is tasked with shaping agricultural and rural behavioral health programs within Colorado's Behavioral Health Administration. More

The AgrAbility program staff has hosted three winter workshops throughout the 2024 year that aim to provide health-related educational opportunities as well as resources to individuals living in rural communities. Four more workshops are scheduled for early 2025.

Missouri

Missouri AgrAbility collaborated with two cohorts of certified occupational therapy assistant (COTA) students from the University of Missouri Department of Occupational Therapy for their community practice projects. This partnership involved working alongside Missouri AgrAbility and MU Extension to research and revise the AgrAbility Client Intake Questionnaire, as well as to create an AgrAbility teaching module.

Leaders in the Field Podcast, hosted by Dr. Mackenzie Bevins, a 2024 grad in occupational therapy who did her capstone with the Missouri AgrAbility Program, is all about helping healthcare pros get a better grip on the agricultural community. It dives into the unique healthcare needs, challenges, and situations that agricultural workers face. More

Emily Doosing, a 4-H specialist with MU Extension, is actively refining the teaching module for Rodeo Clown College. This module covers important topics such as physical and mental health, farm safety, well-being, and AgrAbility. More

Karen Funkenbusch from MU Extension is still offering Missouri AgrAbility training to Dr. Mark Lucas, the new director for the Lincoln University Innovative Small Farmers' Outreach Program, along with its new farm outreach worker for the central region, Bryan de Valdivia.

AgriProspects, supported by the Extension Foundation through a USDA-NIFA federal grant, aims to enhance access to education and skill-building opportunities for rural and underserved populations. The pilot program will be launched in Mesa County at CSU's Western Campus in collaboration with the Colorado Division of Vocational Rehabilitation.

The Purdue University Extension Professional Development Conference (PDC) was held December 4th and 5th at the Tippecanoe County Fairgrounds Event Center in Lafayette, Indiana. This annual gathering brings together nearly 400 Extension professionals, including county Extension educators and campus-based specialists, to network and share experiences, programs, and ideas.



Several Indiana AgrAbility staff members participated in the event and presented breakout sessions to educate fellow Extension professionals about both state and national efforts to assist farm families impacted by disability. Latino Outreach Coordinator Kimber Nicoletti-Martinez highlighted challenges to meeting mental health needs of farmworker communities. Joe Ricker, veteran outreach coordinator, led a roundtable discussion with Extension educators and campus specialists about Extension outreach to veterans. Ed Sheldon and a team of county educators from throughout Indiana introduced a newly developed teaching module titled "Inclusive Emergency Preparedness: Ensuring Safety for Individuals with Disabilities" that will



be available to Extension and AgrAbility staff. Indiana and National AgrAbility Project Director Bill Field led a presentation about grain handling and storage safety and how to better educate Indiana farmers about safe work practices. In addition to the formal presentations, team members were able to visit personally with many Extension colleagues and distribute AgrAbility resources at an exhibit in

IN AgrAbility staff reports were shared prior to open discussions on Vocational Rehabilitation trainings, the Bridging Horizons Contest, and an upcoming AT expo. Following lunch, the group discussed ways in which IN AgrAbility could improve client services, how the advisory team might support staff efforts to contact all clients annually, and any new ideas that might improve the next project proposal from Indiana once the next AgrAbility RFA is received from USDA/NIFA.

The meeting closed with a report on NAP activities in which many of the IN

AgrAbility staff participate plus a challenge to the group to participate personally and through giving to the 2025 NTW.

AgrAbility for Africa

It has been a busy month for AgrAbility for Africa staff who have been analyzing the increasing cases of misdiagnosed hidden conditions, particularly among children of farmers in rural areas. For example, there was a case in 2024 where a child underwent five different examinations at various facilities, each yielding a different diagnosis and resulting in changes to the prescribed medications.

AgrAbility for Africa is leading initiatives to raise awareness of this issue and is advocating for a specialized pediatric team to support affected children and their families. The goal is to reduce the risk of organ damage and ensure access to accurate diagnoses and appropriate treatments for children living with disabilities.
